About the Warby Parker Impact Foundation

The Warby Parker Impact Foundation is a nonprofit dedicated to helping people overcome the barriers that prevent them from receiving quality vision care.

Warby Parker created the Warby Parker Impact Foundation in 2019. It's the foundation's mission to advocate for wider access to vision services, educate communities on the importance of eye health, and provide people with the eye care they need to lead safe, happy, and productive lives.

Strategic Approach

- Foundation should focus broadly on increasing access to vision care for underserved populations with a specific focus on:
 - Novel approaches to deliver eye care for the school-age population domestically
 - Ensuring sustainable systems for eye care delivery globally
- Key areas:
 - **Program**-related investments
 - Research
 - Education
- Emphasis across all work should be sustainability, community engagement/partnerships, and leveraging technology to improve access to care and vision outcomes

Pupils Project

- In 2015, Warby Parker created **Pupils Project**, a program with organizations and local government agencies which provides free vision screenings, eye exams, and glasses to schoolchildren, for many of whom this is their first pair. This model eliminates barriers to access by providing free prescription glasses and meeting children at school, where teachers are often the first to spot vision issues.
- Pupils Project is a public-private partnership; our partners administer the vision screenings and eye exams in the students' classrooms, and Warby Parker provides prescription glasses dreamed up by Warby Parker's design team.
- To date, over 220,000 glasses have been distributed through the program.

Warby Parker Inc. donates the glasses for Pupils Project inkind; the Warby Parker Impact Foundation assists with obtaining funding for other program services.


