Academy Heritage



- Merchant Marine Act of 1936 Established Federal merchant marine cadet program to educate mariners to serve the economic needs of the Nation.
- 1941-1945 WWII shipboard training; 142 cadet-midshipmen lost their lives.
- **September 30, 1943** Dedication by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, who noted that: "the Academy serves the Merchant Marine as West Point serves the Army and Annapolis the Navy."
- **1947** Academy began granting four-year Bachelor of Science degrees.
- 1956 U.S. Congress made the Academy permanent.
- **1974** First federal service academy to enroll female students.








General Eligibility Requirements

- Code of Federal Regulations:
 - Deck, Engineering and Nautical Science curricula
 - General education and electives
- Department of the Navy:
 - History, Security Policy, English and Naval Science courses
- ➤ Middle States Commission on Higher Education:
 - "a program of a length appropriate to the objectives of the degree, designed to foster coherent learning and promote synthesis.
- Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology (ABET)

Satisfied through five Bachelors degree programs leading to commissions in the Armed Forces and a USCG license as a Merchant Mariner.


Work in the maritime industry for 5 years Maintain U.S. Coast Guard License for 6 years Serve in the U.S. Navy Reserve for 8 years






Alcohol awareness and misuse prevention education at USMMA


- Regularly provided to Midshipmen at USMMA over 4 years by:
 - Office of the Commandant
 - Department of Health Services
 - Department of Professional Development and Career Services,
 - Sexual Assault Prevention and Response Office
 - Department of Naval Science
- At stages to include Indoctrination, pre-Sea Year,
 Reintegration, and leadership training

Education and expectations, continued


- Amnesty for reporting collateral conduct, including underage drinking, when reporting sexual misconduct
- Mentors, safe spaces, and shipmate program
- The Midshipman pub at USMMA for seniors; expectations, and training

- Upcoming confidential (1:1) surveys of Midshipmen after Sea Year by SAPRO





Responding to alcohol misuse: Issues and perspectives

- Students have not been disenrolled for alcohol misuse in isolation
- However, it is not uncommon for students to be disenrolled for misconduct secondary to alcohol use
- USMMA cadets on Sea Year
- Access to mental health counselors at sea, as well as Alcohol and Narcotics Anonymous virtual groups and the SAPRO 24/7/365 Hotline



EMBARC implementation; standardizing expectations across the industry

- Lessons learned: Uniform standards and expectations across the industry should benefit all mariners
- Focus on particular protective and risk factors, e.g., effective education; effective anti-contraband measures, liquor lockers, others
- Harmonizing expectations and standards to all vessels, including public vessels
