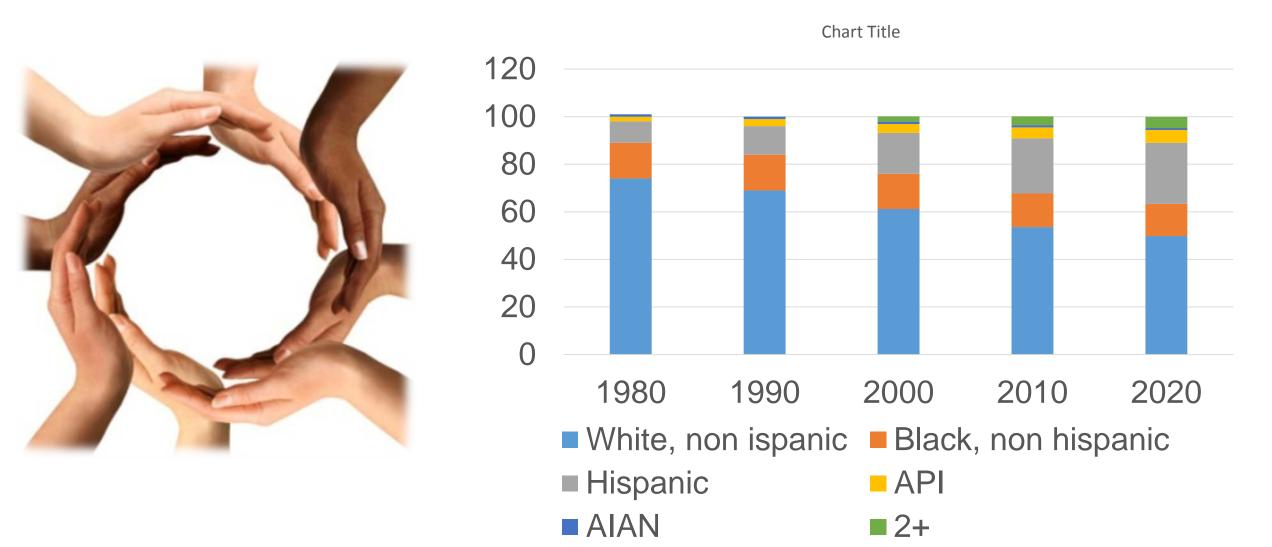

### Relevant points for today

- Major demographic shift = increasing ethnic-racial diversity
- Children quite aware of ethnicity/race and learn it early
- One source of learning is via discrimination experiences, a racial stressor
- Family racial socialization messages can compensate for or even buffer the negative consequences of discrimination

The U.S. Child population is more ethnically-racially diverse than it has been in our history

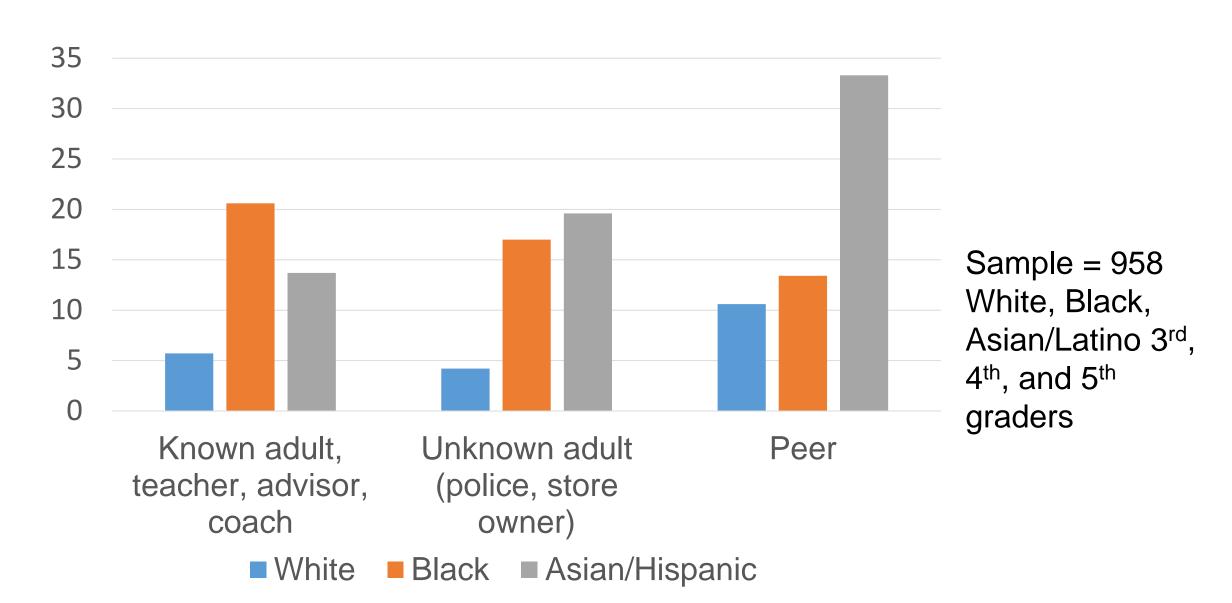


## Family ethnic/racial socialization processes are critical because

- Youth are already learning race on their own
- Youth are living in racialized contexts
  - high racial disparities
  - segregation
  - negative media representations of race
- The discrimination youth experience is a developmental risk factor

Percent of youth who reported unfair treatment from each source AND cited race as a reason from among many reasons (grade in school, gender, way you look)

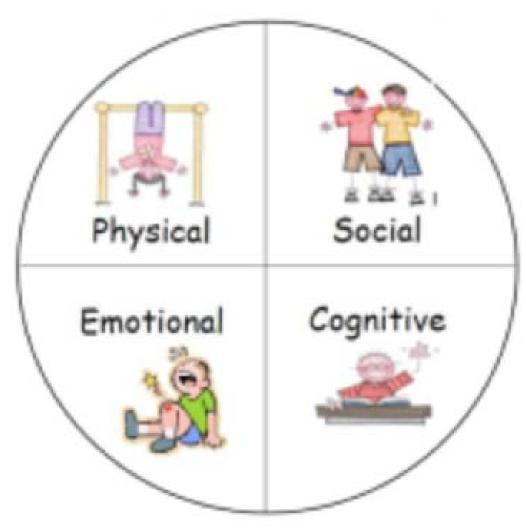
EARLY ADOLESCENT DEVELOPMENT STUDY (Hughes, 2000)



Discrimination is a developmental risk factor for ethnic-racial minority youth

 Associated with poorer outcomes across multiple developmental domains

- Not just a temporary set back
  - Among Black, Dominican and Chinese early adolescents
    - Discrimination in 6<sup>th</sup> grade = poorer psychological, academic, and social adjustment in 8<sup>th</sup> grade
    - Discrimination in 8<sup>th</sup> grade = poorer psychological, academic, and social adjustment in 11<sup>th</sup> grade (Hught Del Toro, Harding, Way & Rarick, 2016)
  - Cumulative discrimination assessed during adolescence was more important than discrimination during adulthood in predicting some cortisol pattern among Black and White youth (Adam et al., 2015)



### Parental ethnic-racial socialization messages that are compensatory or protective

#### **Cultural Socialization**

Socialization of cultural knowledge, awareness of group history, heritage, group traditions, and practices

- Grounds youth in solid and positive sense of themselves
- Promotes youths' group attachment, pride, and positive identities
- as group members
- Promotes resilience in the face of race-related stressors
- Promotes resistance

#### **Preparation for Bias**

Socialization about the existence of discrimination, racial bias, and racial stereotypes accompanied by strategies for overcoming or coping with these

- On one hand, at moderate levels can buffer negative effects of discrimination on adjustment
- BUT, can promote expectations of discrimination as well
