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The House Committee requested an evidence-based, non-partisan study on policies, programs, and investments to better understand the landscape of breastfeeding promotion, initiation, and support across the United States.

The overarching goal of this study is to provide evidence to increase initiation and exclusive breastfeeding for first 3-6 months; identify social determinants; and reduce disparities.

Study Tasks

- ✓ Analyze macroeconomic, social, and health costs and benefits of the current breastfeeding rates and goals in the United States
- ✓ Examine racial, geographic, and income-related breastfeeding disparities
- ✓ Build on known inequalities in breastfeeding rates
- ✓ Identify existing gaps in knowledge (areas for needed research)
- ✓ Discuss challenges in data collection to address gaps
- ✓ Offer policies and interventions for federal, state, local investments/support
- ✓ Propose recommendations for achieving the HP2030 breastfeeding goals (contributors to HP2020)
- ✓ Develop best practices for care, systems, workforce, employers, and community to support breastfeeding
