Al Fears and Broader Context

Societal Inequality

Creates concern about "winners" and "losers"

Voice/Representation

Creates concern about function and functionality of AI, bias/ethics, potential misuse

Technology marketed for bottom-line

Creates concern about job loss, fairness/justice, monitoring, impact on quantity and quality of jobs
