PURPOSE AND INTENT

From the air we breathe to the water we drink, our health is defined by our natural environment. Environmental health is the science that focuses on reducing harmful environmental exposures in air, water, soil and food to protect human health and well-being, as well as provide all communities with healthier environments. The Environmental Health Matters Initiative (EHMI) convenes government, industry, and academic leaders to share ideas and form connections that inspire the development of solutions to our most pressing environmental health challenges.

In line with the mission of EHMI, the aim of this workshop is to bring the public health and climate science communities together to strive toward a shared understanding of the intersections between climate change and health equity issues related to the environment, and to provide a forum for decision-makers and scientists to hear from community leaders about their experiences, solutions, and needs related to health disparities that are exacerbated by climate change.

Slido was chosen as a tool to foster community engagement and conversation in a virtual environment. To achieve the goals of EHMI and this workshop, open dialogue between participants of all sectors is essential. The planning committee believes that Slido will balance this need with the challenges of a virtual world.

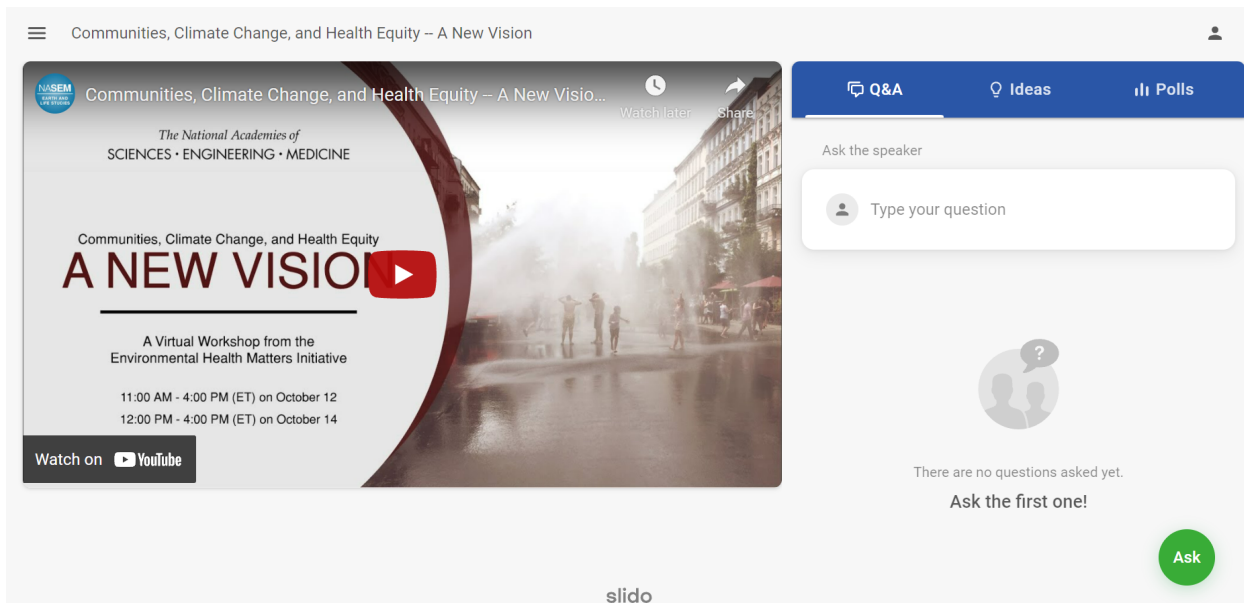
What is Slido?

Slido is an easy to use Q&A and polling platform. It helps people to get the most out of meetings and events by bridging the gap between speakers and their audiences. Slido

is used by anyone looking to enable open conversation at a live meeting, whether in-person or virtual.

How Do I Access It?

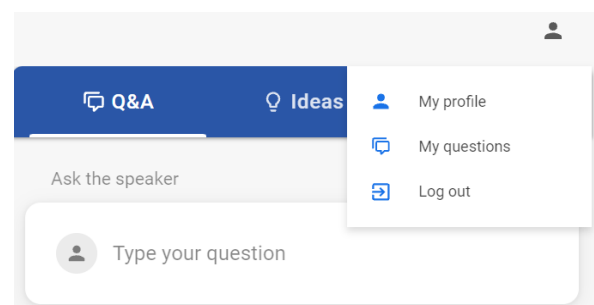

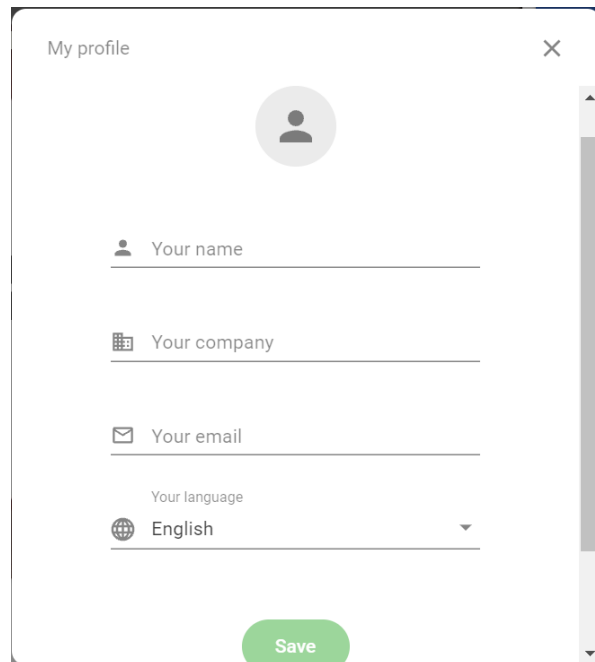


Once you've navigated to the page, you will be taken to a screen that displays the live stream of the workshop, and three tabs: a **Q&A** section, **Ideas** section, and a **Polls** section (see below).

Creating a Profile

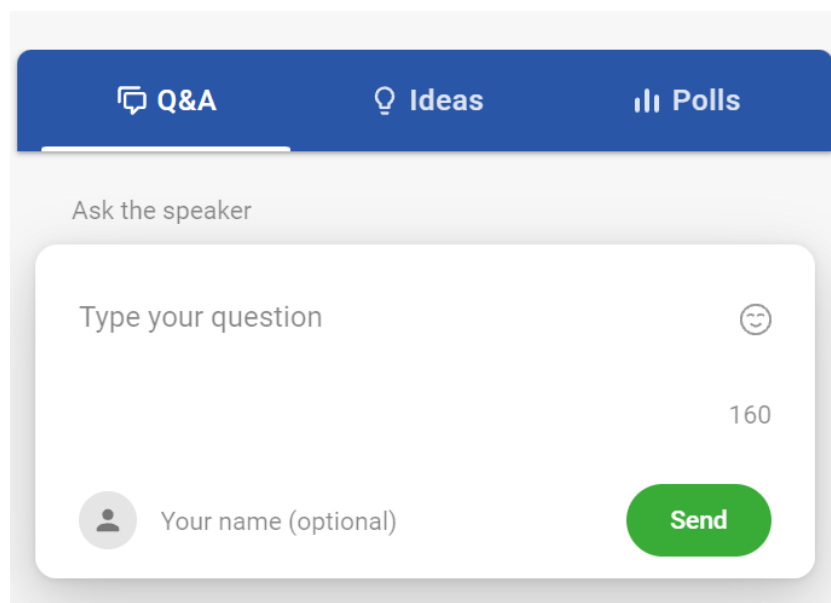
In the top right corner of the screen, you should see a small icon of a person. Click that and it will prompt you to input your first and last name, affiliation, and email address. Doing this will allow us to see who is asking questions, submitting ideas, and answering polls. Your information will be saved, and you will not have to input it again when you go to ask a question, submit an answer, or fill out a poll.



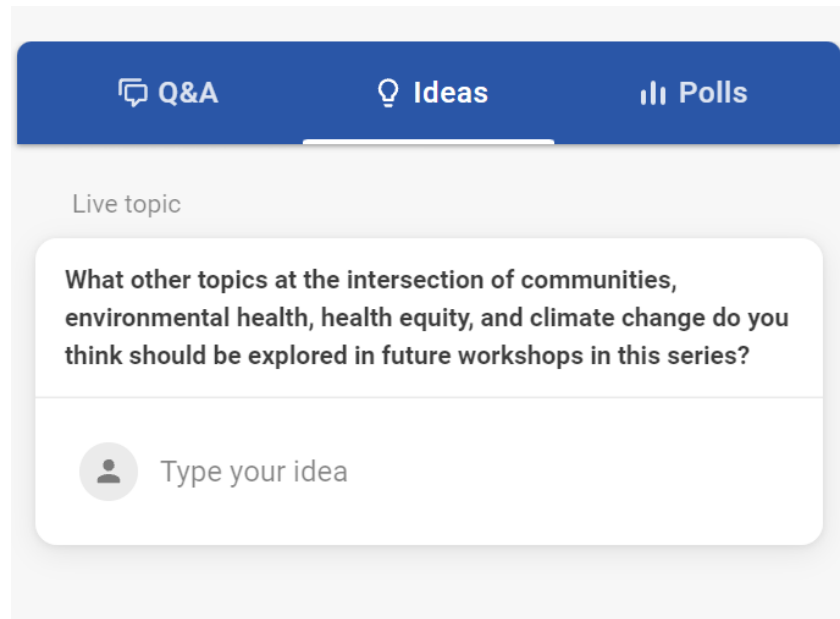

Q&A: You can ask questions for our panelists and speakers by typing your questions in the prompt box and hitting the green “Send” button.

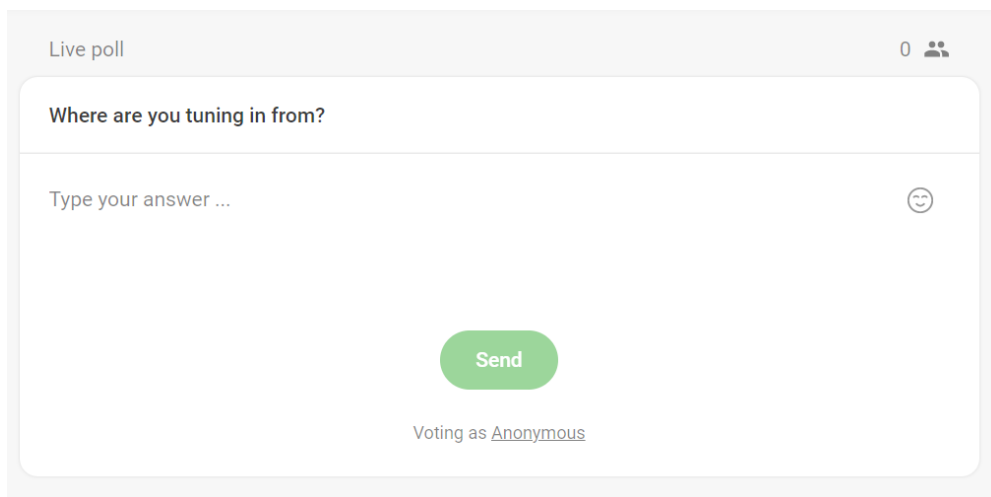

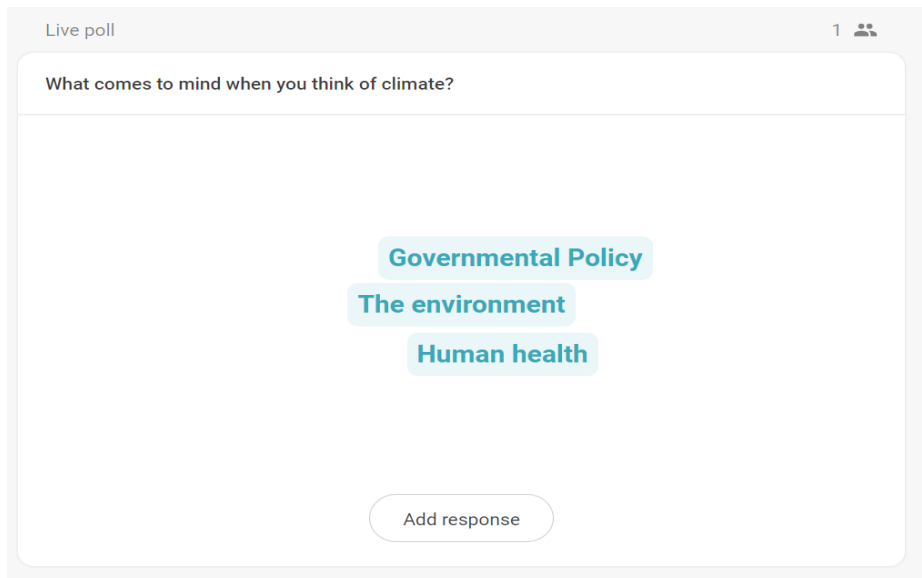

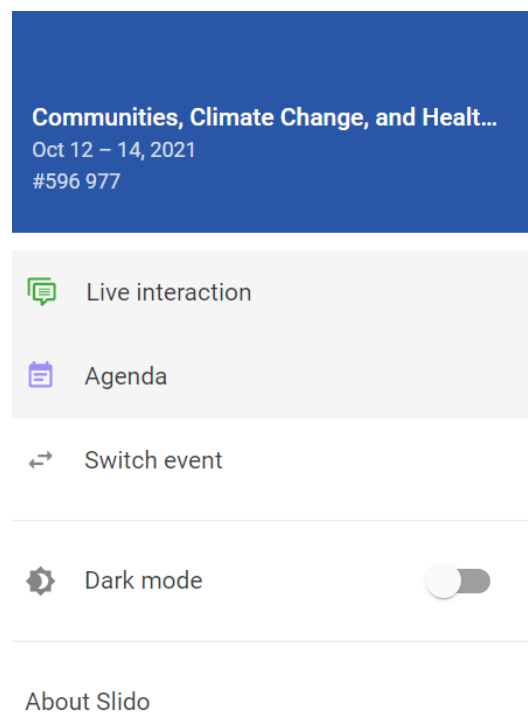
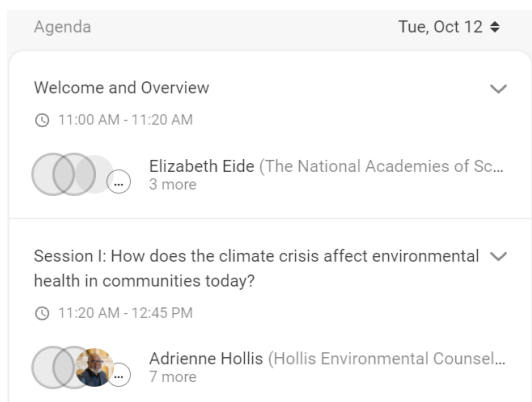
You'll be able to edit your responses even after you send them in.
