
# Issues in Planning for Potassium Iodide Distribution NY State Perspective

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#### KI Distribution in New York State

- Previously KI only distributed to emergency workers and captive populations
- Changed KI distribution policy to general public in 2001
- Based on FDA recommendations
- Careful evaluation of risk and benefits with assistance from Radiological Health Advisory Committee -Considered data post-Chernobyl and experience in Poland
- Committee recommended change in policy benefit outweighed risk



# Changing the KI Policy Not an Easy Task

- Convened multi-disciplinary, multi-agency team
  - State and Local Health and Emergency Management, State Education, Board of Pharmacy, Utilities
- Developed criteria for when to recommend KI
- Team focused on implementation, outreach and education and communication issues
  - Members of the Public
  - Schools and Day Care Centers
  - Workers
  - Physicians



#### Some Implementation Issues

#### **Schools and Day Care Centers**

- At the time, KI only available in 130 mg tablets
  - Required letter from Health Commissioner to State Education and Office of Children and Family Services Commissioners advising OK during emergency to use one 130 mg dose
- Children doses not available
  - Liquid KI not available
  - Instructions for pill crushing and mixing had to be included in message
- Needed approval for non-nurses to dispense in school settings
- "Opt out" forms for schools



### Who is Responsible for Decisions Related to Distribution of KI?

- NY is a "home rule" state --- Counties make decisions
- State Health Lead Agency for radiological emergency response recommended change in State KI Policy
- Agreement from all seven counties in 10 mile EPZ to participate
- State obtained KI from NRC and distributed to counties
- Counties developed their own distribution plan
- Different counties used different distribution approaches



#### When to take KI

#### **Emergency Workers**

- Upon declaration of a General Emergency
- Workers located in 10 Mile EPZ



#### When to take KI

#### Schools and Day Care Centers

Upon declaration of Site Area Emergency – schools in "keyhole" (2 miles around, 5 miles downwind) are instructed to evacuate\* and take\*\* KI with them (on the buses or other means of transportation)



<sup>\*</sup> As a precautionary action

<sup>\*\*</sup>Distinction between "take" and "ingest"

#### When is KI Recommended

#### **General Public:**

- Upon declaration of a General Emergency
- Tied to evacuation decision
  - People advised to evacuate, take KI with them if they have it, but told not to delay evacuation
  - KI available at Reception Centers
- Also recommend take KI if shelter-in-place due to difficulty in evacuation



#### New York State Plans for KI Distribution

- Pre- and post- distribution of KI
- Pre-distributed to counties in the 10-mile EPZ
  - Schools, day care centers, general public, county
- Distribution by Counties include: "KI days"; local grocery/pharmacy; county offices
- Distribution included fact sheets (low reading level, high reading level, school, physicians)
- Low reading level fact sheets translated to multiple languages



#### Why Some States Do not Pre-Distribute KI

- Cost of implementation (not just for the state but for the local counties)
- Low population densities and short evacuation times for their EPZ's,
- Concern that people may incur increased radiation dose from a radioactive plume if they assume that KI will protect them from all isotopes
- Difficulty experienced by other states in maintaining and tracking doses of KI previously distributed.
- States that opted out of the KI distribution can still request KI from the Strategic National Stockpile or other emergency response caches in their states.

## Lessons Learned from the Fukushima Accident

- Public Information is Key
  - Need for education of general public and the media of what KI is and is not good for

#### It is not an anti-radiation pill

- When is recommended to take
- Non nuclear power plant states still need to have KI information on their web sites





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
