


### U.S. Population Projections (Thousands)

### The looming workforce crisis

- By 2030: More than 70 million people 65 years and older
  - 20% of the population
- By 2050: Number needing long-term care will more than double
  - 8 million in 2000 to 19 million in 2050
- Who will care for those with long-term care (LTC) needs?
  - NAM report (2008) projected 3.5 million additional workers by 2030



### Long-term care settings and workforce

- Settings for LTC
  - 25% institutions
    - Nursing homes
    - Assisted living
  - 75% home and community based services (HCBS)




### Long-term care settings and workforce

- Workers within institutions: mostly RNs, LPNs, CNAs
- Workers in HCBS include....
  - Family, friends, social networks, clergy
  - Direct-care workers
  - Registered nurses, licensed practical nurses
  - Care managers, navigators
  - Carpenters, plumbers, etc.
  - Therapists (PT, OT)
  - Pharmacists
  - Physicians, advanced practice nurses, physician assistants



### Jobs in long-term care, 2016



Total personal care aide employment in healthcare & social assistance = 1,706,200



#### Physicians

- Geriatrics family or internal medicine, 1-year fellowship
  - 152 programs, 343 trainees in 2017
  - Many slots unfilled, up to 80% filled by international graduates
  - Half do not re-certify are they still working in geriatrics?
  - Shortfall of ~13,000 by 2030
- Palliative medicine family or internal medicine, pediatrics, oncology, anesthesia, psychiatry, 1 year fellowship
  - 122 programs, 325 fellows in 2017
  - Shortfall of ~6,000 in 2010
- Few dual programs, 2-year commitment




#### Nurse practitioners

- ~250,000 NPs, 60% are family NPs
  - <10% work as adult-gerontology NPs (AGNP)</li>
  - Gerontological NP certification ended 2015, changed to AGNP
- Education is in schools of nursing
  - Clinical preceptors usually NPs
- Palliative specialty certificate programs might be with physicians

#### Some glimmers of hope

- Independence at Home demonstration program
  - Home care teams led by physicians and NPs



- Include physician assistants, pharmacists, social workers, home care workers, family members, and other staff
- Many sites are connected to health professions education
- Veterans Health Administration programs
  - Nursing homes with low turnover
  - Patient Aligned Care Teams, home care



- Large training programs, ~60% of workforce in geriatric-related care had some VA rotation or training
- Training home care aides to be part of the team
  - CMMI pilot in California
