Food systems and diets are changing, presenting challenges and opportunities

The trend: Food is becoming more

- Purchased: 50% in SSA, 70% in Asia
- **Perishable:** 50-70% of dietary costs are related to meats, dairy, fruit & vegetables
- **Processed:** More than 50%



The challenge:

- Globally, 3 billion people have low quality diets
- Nearly half of all countries are experiencing simultaneous problems of undernutrition, overweight and obesity
- Perishable foods tied to food safety concerns

The opportunity:


- Harness agriculture and food systems to improve diet quality through greater availability and accessibility of high-quality foods
- Promote agribusiness and entrepreneurship opportunities beyond the farm to increase incomes, improve consumers' ability to afford healthy diets, and provide food options that support health






New Evidence!

- Huge (and understated) health burden of foodborne disease
- Huge (and understated) economic burden of foodborne disease
- Foodborne disease and food safety affect nutrition through multiple pathways
- Little attention to food safety in domestic markets
- Rising consumption of riskier foods -- nutritious animal source foods (including seafood) and fruits and vegetables
- Rising consumer demand for food safety
