Felony for anyone “other than the mother” to “intentionally destroy the life of an unborn child” except to “save the life of the mother”

September 2023

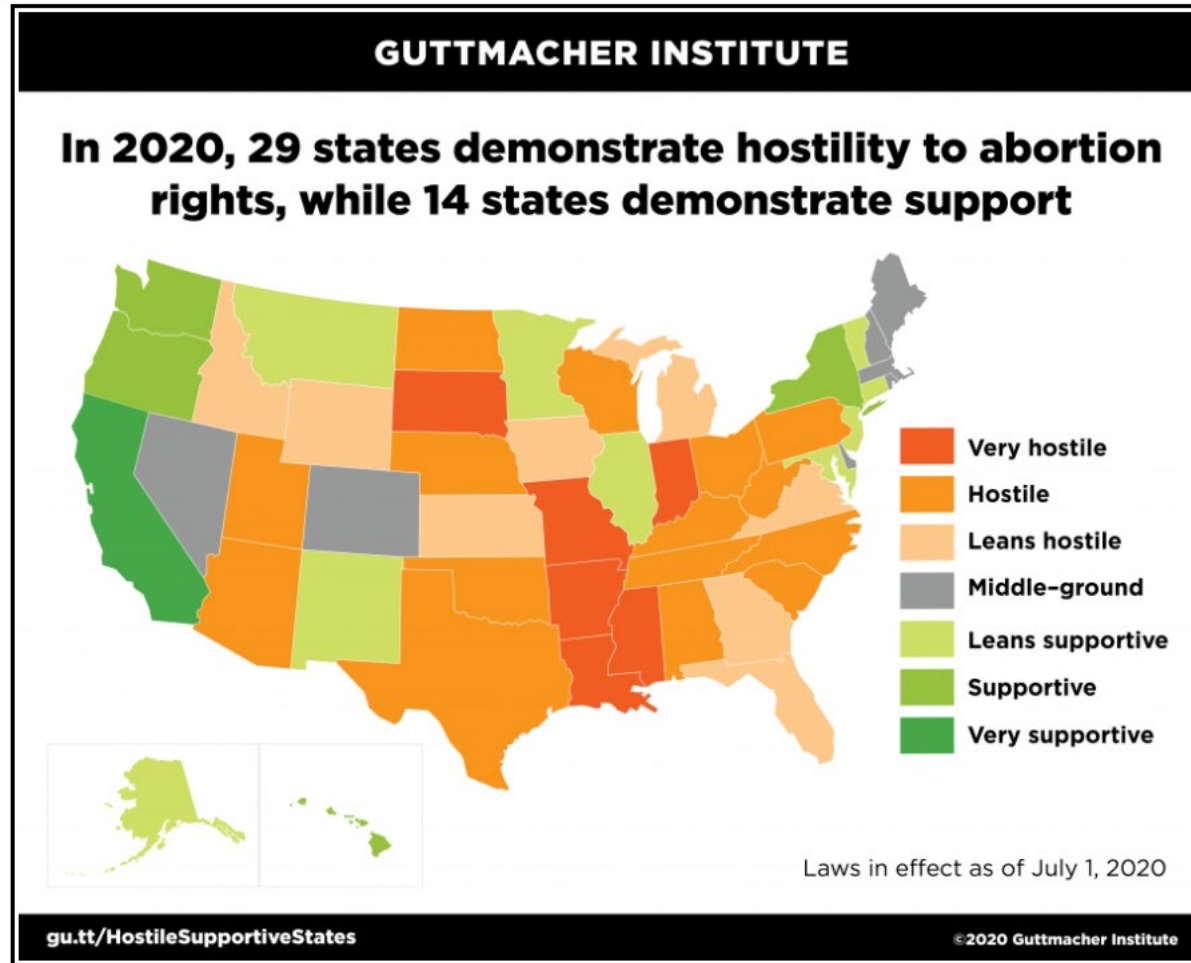
Circuit court rules that law does not prohibit voluntary abortion

Wisconsin has been “post-*Roe*” for years



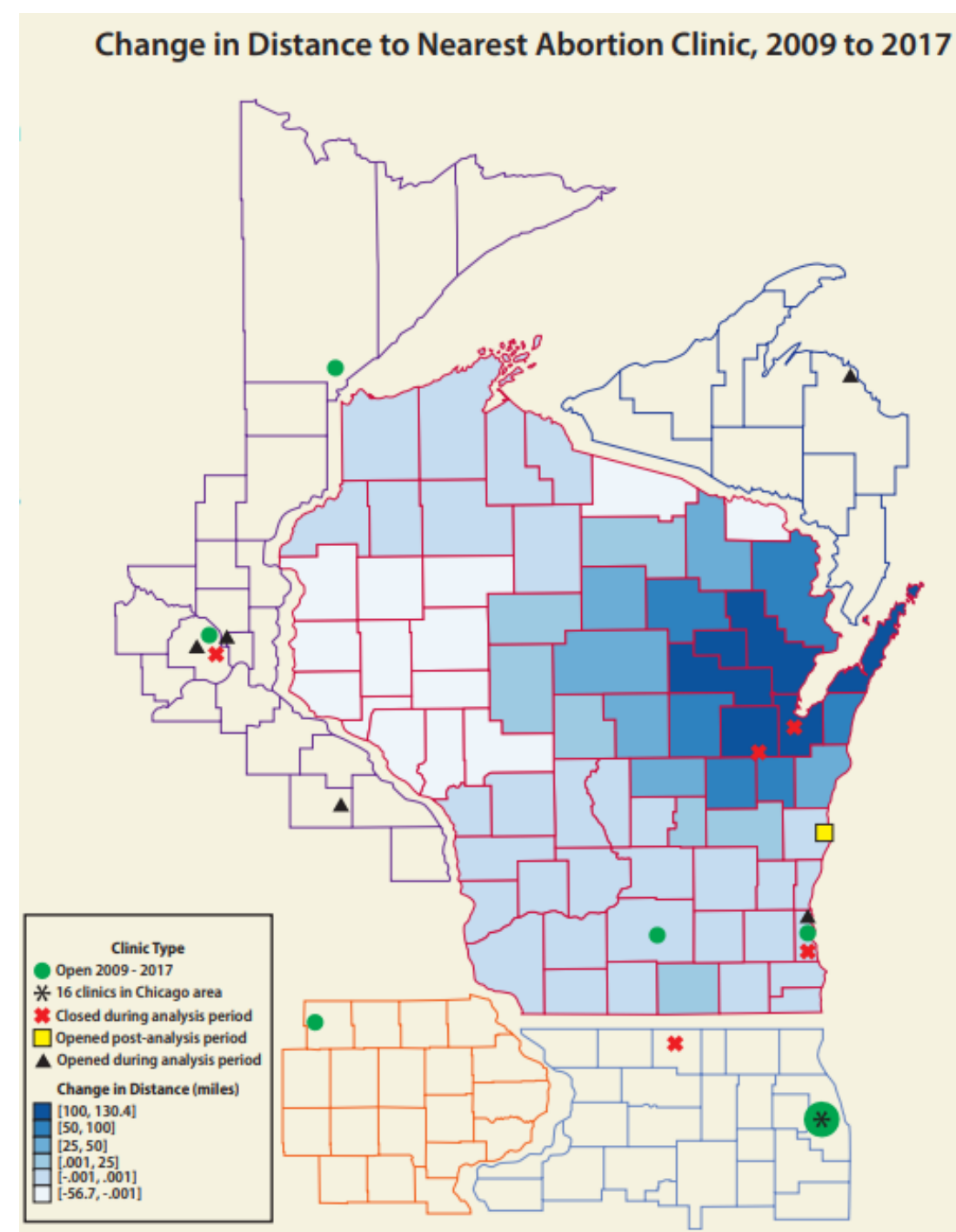
Pre-*Dobbs* Wisconsin abortion restrictions

- Ban on:
 - Medicaid coverage and State of Wisconsin insurance coverage
 - Telehealth abortion
 - Abortion past 20 weeks' gestational duration
- Mandated:
 - 24-hour waiting period
 - Same doctor for medication abortion counseling and pill dispensation
 - Ultrasound
 - Unscientific counseling (“psychological trauma,” “danger to subsequent pregnancies”)



Pre-*Dobbs* abortion landscape

- In 2010-2017, 40% of the state's abortion clinics closed
 - CORE documented increased birth rates in counties that lost access
- Just prior to *Dobbs*, only three clinics offered abortion care



Post-*Dobbs* abortion landscape

- Remaining clinics stopped offering abortion services
- Three neighboring states retained access



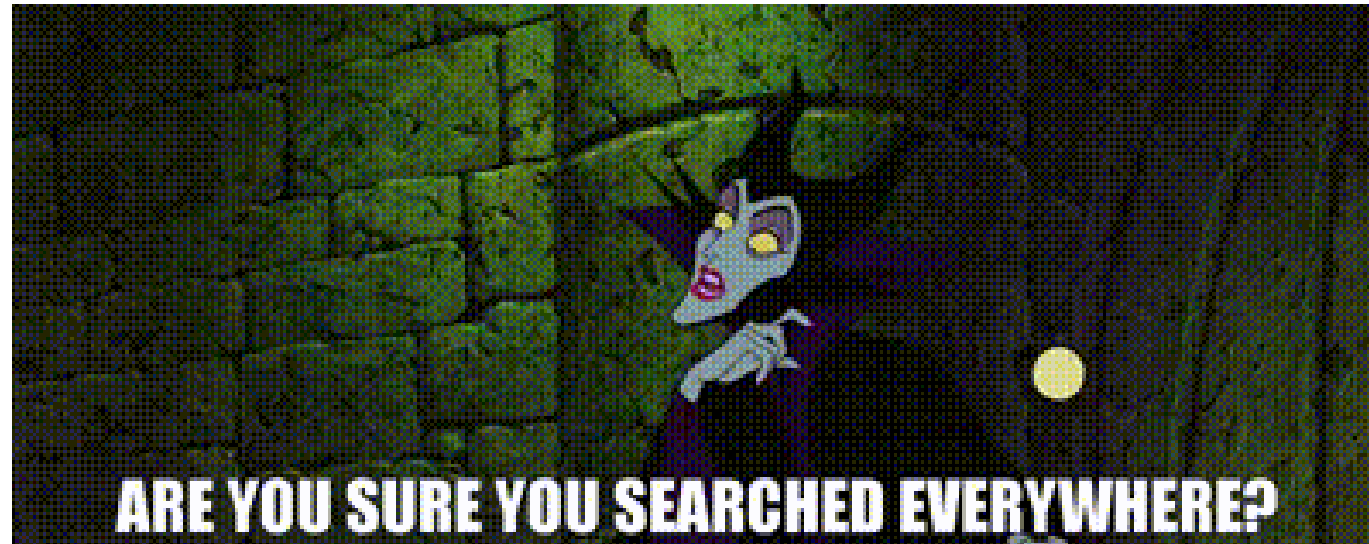

(who never make it to an abortion provider)?



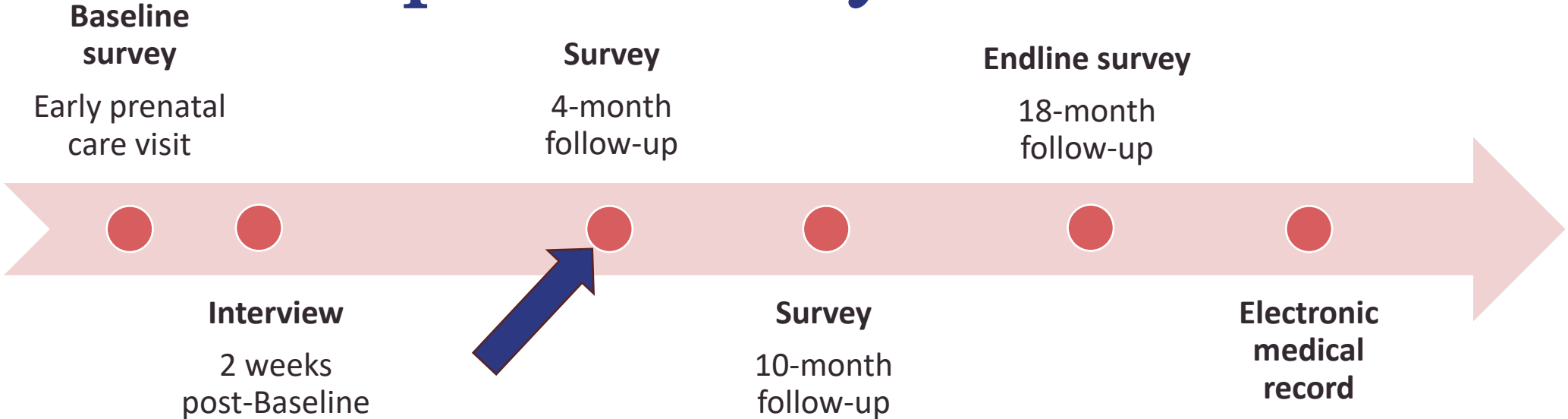

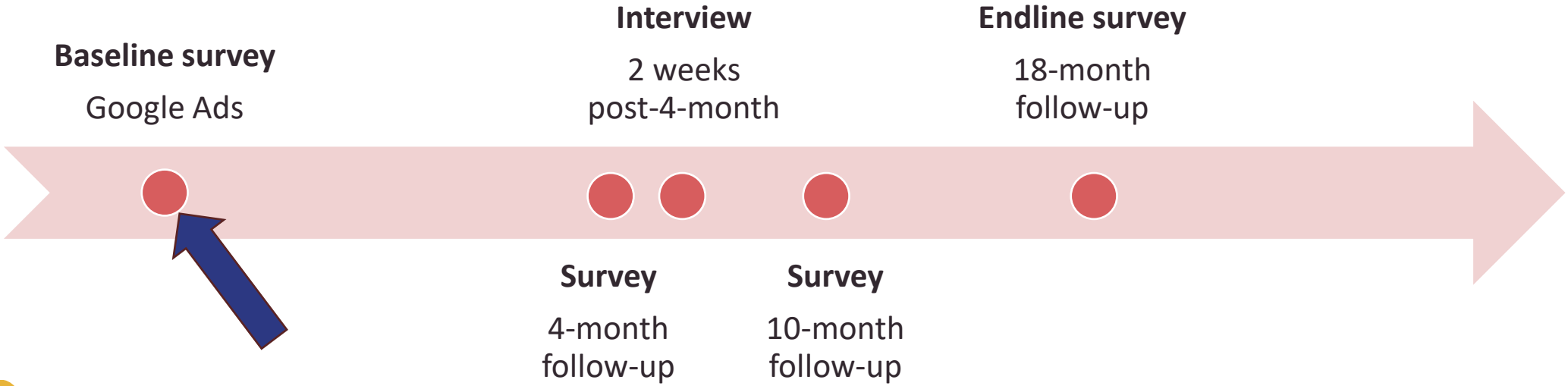


Post-*Roe* impact study timelines

Prenatal care study progress

- 35 out of 212 (one in six) participants report having considered abortion
 - Abortion considerers more likely than non-considerers to report financial scarcity, have Medicaid vs private insurance
- 20 abortion considerers have completed interviews
 - Preliminary themes:
 - Confusion abounds
 - The slide into continuing pregnancy is subtle, not dramatic
 - Abortion consideration is common in context of genetic testing



MAPS study progress

- Study is a partnership with Ibis Reproductive Health and Indiana University
 - Drew on Ibis's previous online work in Indiana
- We continue to hone Google Ads campaign
- So far, 14 Wisconsinites have completed the baseline survey



Challenges to date

- Dynamic legal and healthcare delivery context
- Bad actors and bots
- Folks hard for researchers to find pre-*Dobbs* are even harder to find now



Strategies for success

- Lean into research partnerships
- Maintain critical relationships with Wisconsin partners and providers
- Bake potential for change into instruments and design
- Include data scientists as key team members
- Plan for bad actors in screening, data quality checks



Hope survives!

- Learning opportunities abound
- Our methods are working!

Impacts of abortion restrictions on pregnant

Since the June 2022 U.S. Supreme Court's ruling in *Dobbs v. Jackson Women's Health Organization* overturned *Roe v. Wade*, abortion healthcare services have been unavailable in Wisconsin, except in extremely rare cases. Wisconsin is one of 15 states where abortion is now essentially banned.

Even before *Dobbs*, abortion care was heavily restricted and difficult to access in Wisconsin. Reproductive health policy experts had long classified Wisconsin as hostile to abortion due to a slew of scientifically unfounded laws that reduced access, including perhaps the most onerous medication abortion restrictions in the country.¹ After 40% of the state's abortion clinics closed between 2010 and 2020, CORE researchers documented increases in birth rates in the Wisconsin counties furthest from the remaining clinics.²

What are the implications of yesterday's ruling from the U.S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals on the widely used abortion medication mifepristone? Access to mifepristone **will not change** until the U.S. Supreme Court decides in this case. But if the ruling goes into effect, it **would bring big changes to abortion care.**

✓ The ruling keeps in place the FDA's original approval of mifepristone for abortion and miscarriage care from 2000.

✓ It also keeps in place the FDA's later approval of the generic version of the drug.

✗ But the ruling would reverse

In the post-#Dobbs landscape, 24% of U.S. women of reproductive age must travel at least 90 minutes for care at an abortion facility and 29% have to travel at least an hour. That's from a new study by @wsmedicine, @ucdavis, and @uncchapelhill in @greenjrnl.

If all states the authors categorized as no access, severely limited access, or at risk of losing access enacted abortion bans:

- ✗ 54% of women wouldn't have access within a 30-minute drive
- ✗ 46% and 43% wouldn't have access within a 60- and 90-minute drive, respectively

In #Wisconsin, a total of 3,540 fewer abortions, or 590 fewer abortions each month, took place between June and December 2022 post-#Dobbs compared to prior months. That's from a new report by the #WeCount national abortion counting effort. Read our analysis at the link in our bio.

The #WeCount report documents:

⚠️ Continued steep declines in abortion across the U.S. following the #Dobbs Supreme Court decision

⚠️ Additional abortion numbers in less-restrictive states do not make up for the declines in more-restrictive states, such as Wisconsin.

A new @WiscCORE brief estimates the cost to obtain an abortion in the post-#Roe landscape. For three example #Wisconsin patients traveling to reproductive healthcare centers in neighboring states, costs exceed \$1,000 in each scenario — presenting significant hardship. In context:

📊 About 40% of U.S. adults couldn't cover an unexpected \$400 expense without going into debt.

📊 Due to structural factors, people most in need of abortion care disproportionately experience poverty and financial scarcity.

📊 Research documents that 75% of abortion patients have low incomes.

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On this Labor Day, we share some of the extensive evidence documenting how abortion restrictions:

- ✗ Reduce people's ability to participate in the labor force as they see fit
- ✗ Jeopardize worker recruitment & retention
- ✗ Lessen people's ability to achieve life aspirations (1/5)

By reducing people's ability to participate in the labor force as they see fit and increasing turnover and time off from work, **abortion restrictions** cost state and local economies **\$105 billion annually.**

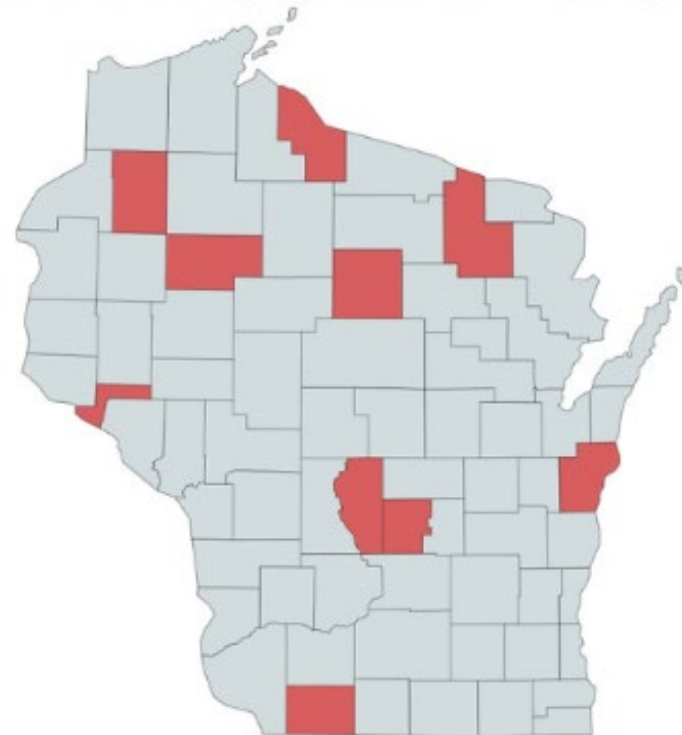

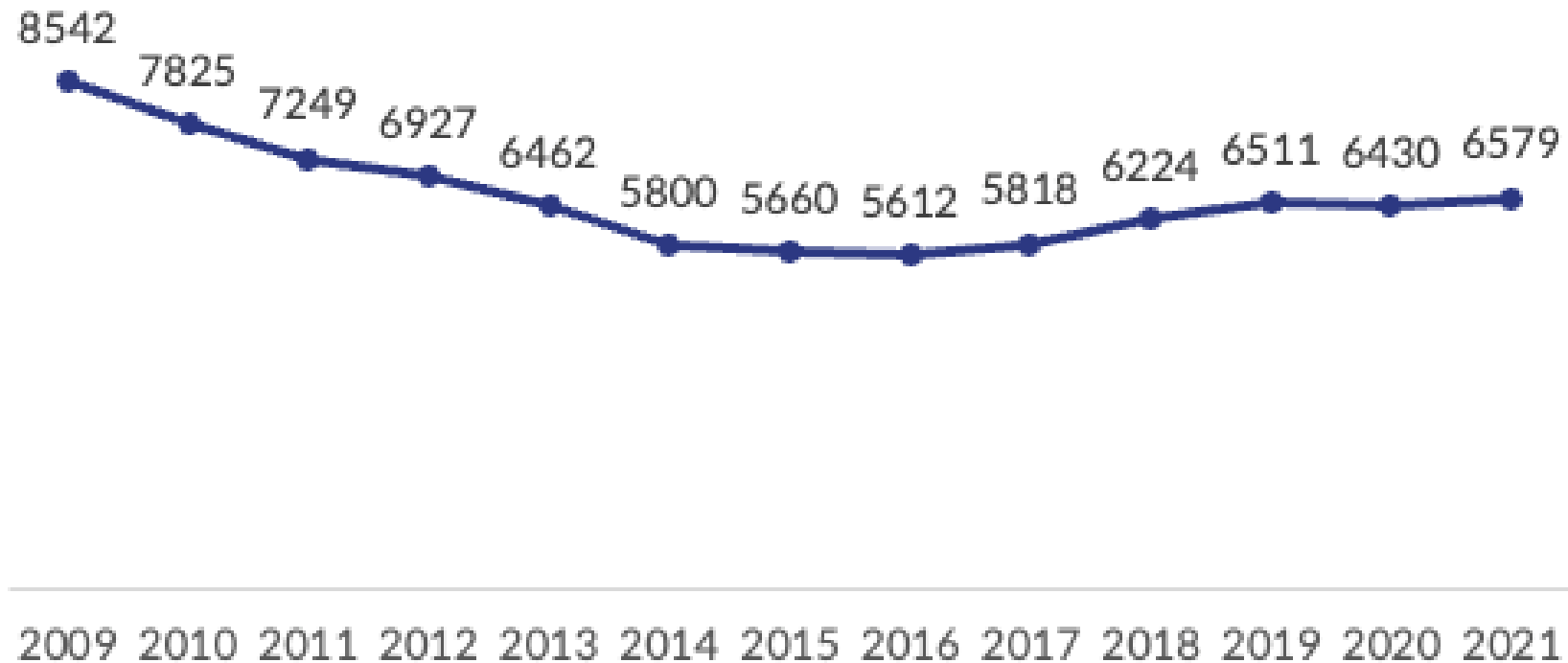


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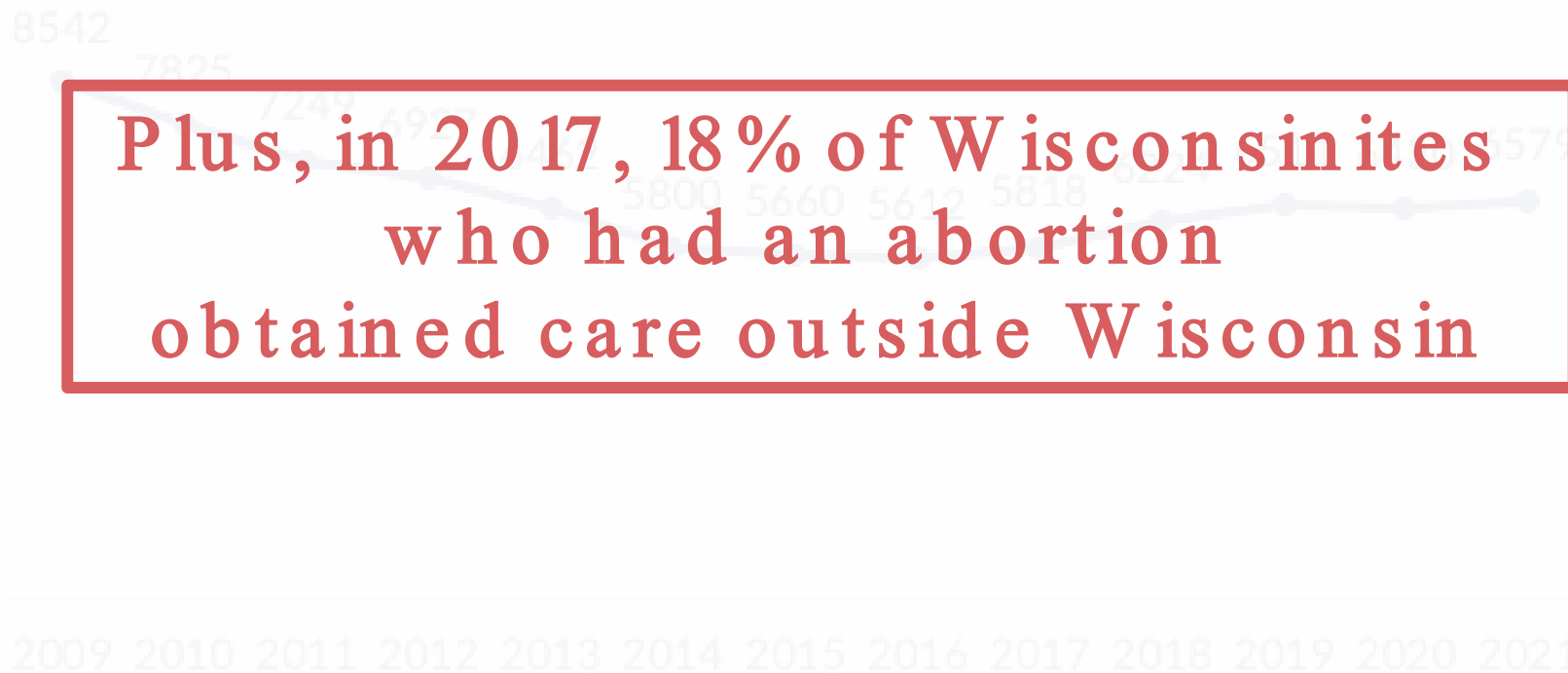

Post-*Dobbs*, what happened to Wisconsinites who wanted abortion?

- Some crossed state lines for abortion
 - However, increases in haven states did not make up for all decreases in ban states
- Some self-managed an abortion
- Some did not have an abortion
