




ALABAMA'S BLACK BELT

INTERSECTION OF RACE AND RURALITY



- Capacity Building Workshops: Provide workshops on governance, financial administration, volunteer management and other tailored trainings to support grantees.
- Community Grants Program: Provide support for a wide variety of projects including volunteer fire departments, tutorial programs, etc.



PROJECT UNITED (Partnership with BBCF Community Associates (volunteers) and the University of Alabama's School of Medicine and Rural Health medical and research staff to conduct research on health disparities in the region.

This research is then owned, IN PARTNERSHIP, with the community and the university. The community must sign off on how and when the

data is used. Community Associates are co-authors on papers that are published in journals.
