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Definitions to ground the conversation

Birth Equity is the assurance of the conditions of **optimal births for** all people with a <u>willingness</u> to address racial and social inequities in a sustained effort.

National Birth Equity Collaborative

Birth Justice is a movement that believes when birthing people recognize their innate power to make the best health decisions for themselves and their families during all stages of the pregnancy, birth, and the post-birth period, that power will have a transformational impact on their family and community.

As a funder, this work starts with three paradigm shifts











<u>Institutional Reframe</u>

Power dynamics through dominant cultures within institutions create challenges for advancing any work. The willingness to do the internal work, address blind spots and change processes has an impact on the deployment of resources, strength of collaborations, and shifting power and assets to the field

Fund the Paradigm Shift

What, how, who, and why?
It is critical to support work
that moves expansively from
'diversity,' clinical outcomes,
and death to include what is
working, addresses root
causes, and builds power. This
is still novel and means
trusting, listening to, and
amplifying new leaders and
messengers

Economic Justice

Under-resourcing is an issue
that impacts all of the
conditions in which care is
accessed and provided. Giving
without restriction builds
power in critical ways, and
must be reflected through
support of Black and Brown
people and their families, as
well as leaders and
organizations in the field



Research Justice is the framework that informs the funding approach

Self Determination

Data and research are currencies that build economic, cultural, and political power - Sovereignty is an outcome

Racism as a factor

Care quality, outcomes, funding, research priorities, etc., are inextricably linked to systemic racism

Capacity is Key

Resources for capacity and infrastructure building are necessary for long-term change and impact

Research Justice is Birth Justice

- What is the care and experience that people want?
- Who is providing that care and experience?
- Who has access and power in the receipt and provision of that care and experience?





In practice, this is an expansive model that reflects the gaps, opportunities, and interconnectedness of issues along the continuum of research
