What civic infrastructure investments are the most important for advancing health equity?

THE SCENARIO

Each group will play the role of the city council of the City of Ourlandia

Details about city:

Social and demographic data:

- Population: 250,000
- 30% Latino, 15% Black, 5% Asian, 2% American Indian/Alaska Native, 48% white
- 10% below federal poverty level; all races represented but due to historical and structural factors Black, brown, and Indigenous people are disproportionately represented

Your city has received \$10M grant from the federal government to invest in civic infrastructure to advance health equity. You need to deliberate about how the funds should be allocated.

THE TASK

Deliberate about how the council should allocate the funding in \$1M increments among 4 "buckets" of civic infrastructure, e.g., \$0 in Govt Agency Coordination, \$4M in Community Media, \$3M in Education, \$3M in Civil Society (and time permitting, specific types of organizations)

Review the 3 questions and complete the Google doc for your group

- (1) Where did you invest the \$10 million dollars? (which of the 4 buckets and toward which specific examples; you may choose more than one bucket and more than one example)
- (2) Was there agreement on some or all of your priorities? Note which ones and explain)
- (3) Was there some or a lot disagreement on your priorities? (Note which ones and explain)


