 - \ odds of using tv, social media, and blogs or celebrity webpages for health information
- Controlling for demographic variables, lower health literacy
 - \prescript trust in health information from specialist doctors and dentists
 - † trust in tv, social media, blogs / celebrity webpages, friends, and pharmaceutical companies



- Independent relationship between inadequate or marginal health literacy (OR 1.80 and 2.20) and physician distrust.
- HL not significantly associated with institutional distrust





- MIDDLE HL GROUP: highest degree of trust






