Dear Colleagues:

Welcome to the workshop on *Integrating Serious Illness Care into Primary Care Delivery*, hosted by the Roundtable on Quality Care for People with Serious Illness at the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine. Due to restrictions on travel and public gatherings during the COVID-19 pandemic, the full-day workshop originally scheduled as an in-person meeting in Washington, DC has been converted into two webinars that will be held on June 10 and June 17, 2021.

The first webinar will feature brief opening remarks by Dr. Ada Stewart, President of the American Academy of Family Physicians. The first session of the workshop will explore the shared principles of primary care, serious illness care, and specialty palliative care as outlined in the 2021 NASEM report on Implementing High Quality Primary Care, as well as the National Consensus Project (NCP) Clinical Practice Guidelines for Quality Palliative Care. These presentations will be anchored in the lived experience of an individual's story with serious illness navigating both primary care and specialty palliative care. The second session explores the interdisciplinary care teams that deliver both primary care and palliative care, with a discussion of opportunities to raise the bar for caring for people with serious illness care in all communities.

The June 17 webinar will feature two sessions as well. The workshop will open with another patient's story, leading into the day's first session exploring the policy mechanisms to support high quality serious illness care and the ways in which quality measurement, policy, research, and payment can be aligned to improve patient and caregiver experience. The final session of the workshop features real-life examples of 'building the bridge' between serious illness care and primary care to deliver high-quality, integrated care. Speakers will discuss best practices for embedding palliative care into primary care, and considerations for sustainability.

Each of the workshop sessions will include a brief panel discussion, followed by Q&A with webinar participants. A summary of this workshop will be published by the National Academies Press. 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

SPEAKERS AND MODERATORS

Claire Ankuda, MD, is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Geriatrics and Palliative Medicine at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai. A Vermonter, she earned an MD from the University of Vermont and a MPH from the Harvard School of Public Health before going to the University of Washington for family medicine residency. She was then a Robert Wood Johnson Clinical Scholar at the University of Michigan during which time she conducted a 6-month policy externship at the Center for Medicare & Medicaid Innovation. Following this, she completed a Palliative Medicine fellowship at Mount Sinai. Dr. Ankuda is a health services researcher who aims to assess the impact of payment policies and health systems on outcomes for seriously ill older adults and their families.

Lori Bishop, MHA, BSN, RN is a healthcare nurse executive focused on innovative and transformational interdisciplinary care delivery models for the vulnerable seriously ill population. Lori has an extensive clinical background in hospice and palliative care. Her current position is Vice President of Palliative and Advanced Care at NHPCO. Previously, Lori was the Chief Advanced Illness Management (AIM) Executive for Sutter Health serving an average daily census of 2500 seriously ill patients across Northern California. Under her leadership, the Sutter Health AIM program reduced total program cost by 13% two consecutive years while achieving full performance for quality metrics. In 2017, she restructured the program including widespread implementation of primary palliative care in home health; implemented a standard palliative care patient satisfaction survey through a national vendor; implemented daily huddle, bi-weekly case conference, and monthly care conference leveraging patient level data to drive performance and care coordination. AIM received the inaugural Vanguard Award from the California Hospital Quality Institute in 2016. In her previous executive role at UnityPoint Health, Lori facilitated the creation of a system-wide palliative care program across care settings by developing standard clinical, operational, satisfaction, and financial metrics across sites of service. The system-wide integrated Palliative Care program received the prestigious Circle of Life Award in 2013. The team enhanced and optimized the electronic health record to pull clinical data for metric reporting and shared their build with other Epic users.

Erin Bradshaw is the Chief of Mission Delivery for the Patient Advocate Foundation. She provides leadership in the design, delivery, and oversight of the case management division to ensure the achievement of the organization's philosophy, mission and goals and objectives. Her 23 years' experience with PAF has been spent improving patients' lives around the nation.

Karen Bullock, PhD, LCSW is Professor and Head of the Department of Social Work at North Carolina State University, in the College of Humanities and Social Sciences. She earned her PhD in Sociology and Social Work from Boston University, her Master's degree in Social Work, from Columbia University, and her Bachelor of Social Work degree from North Carolina State University. She is Affiliate Faculty at the Institute for Collaboration on Health, Intervention, and Policy (InCHIP) at the University of Connecticut. Dr. Bullock has more than 20 years of clinical practice experience

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in mental health and aging, with interests and expertise in health care disparities and end-of-life care issues. She is a John A. Hartford Faculty Scholar and serves on several national boards and committees, including Social Work Hospice & Palliative Care Network (SWHPN), the American Cancer Society (ACS) Oncology Social Work Research Peer Review Committee, and is current Chair of the NASW Mental Health Section Committee. Dr. Bullock's research focuses on cancer care and social support for older adults with non-curable illnesses. Her article on The Influence of Culture on End-of-Life Decision Making, won the 2012 Best Article Award by the Routledge Journal of Social Work in End-of-Life & Palliative Care. She has been a leading force in advancing social work practice, education, and training in gerontology, mental health, palliative and end-of-life care. In addition, Dr. Bullock he has been quoted in the Washington Post, USA Today and LA Times as an expert in these areas. Dr. Bullock has published and presented nationally and internationally on these topics. She was a Visiting Scholar at the Mailman School of Public Health at Columbia University and previously held appointments at the Institute of Living/Hartford Hospital, the University of Connecticut, Salem State College, Smith College, and UNC-Wilmington.

Patricia M. Davidson, PhD, MED, RN, FAAN Across her career, Dr. Davidson has been committed to developing innovative, person-centered models of care. She has been a registered nurse for four decades and has clinical, teaching and practice expertise in cardiovascular science and the care of vulnerable populations, particularly those with chronic and complex conditions. As Dean and Professor of the Johns Hopkins School of Nursing, she is strongly involved in doctoral education and strongly committed to mentorship of new investigators. She is committed to diversity, equity, inclusion and workforce development and interdisciplinary practice. To promote these values, she currently serves as the Secretary General of the Secretariat of the World Health Organizations Collaborating Centers for Nursing and Midwifery, and Counsel General of the International Council on Women's Health Issues. She is a member of Sigma Theta Tau International's Institute for Global Healthcare Leadership Advisory Board and a Board Member of the Consortium of Universities for Global Health. She also serves on the Board of Health Care Services for the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine. Throughout her career she has been devoted to mentoring the next generation of health professionals and scientists. Across her career she has mentored 43 pre-doctoral and 15 post doctoral trainees. She has also been actively involved in mentorship of early career researchers and nurse scientists. In 2016 she was the first nurse to receive the Australian Museum Eureka Prize for Outstanding Mentor of Young Researchers, the most prestigious research mentorship award in Australia. Dr. Davidson has over 550 publications in Scopus. Her H -Index is 45 (Scopus) and 66 in Google Scholar and i-10 Index is 385 and she has published 32 book chapters. Many of these publications are with students, mentees, clinical collaborators and fellow nurse scientists. Over her career she has received funding as prinicipal investigator from the National Institutes of Health, the National Health & Medical Research Council (NIH Equivalent Australia), Australian Research Council (NSF Equivalent Australia). She also currently serves as the Co- Director of the Enrichment Core for the NINR P30 Promoting Resilience in Persons with Multiple Chronic Conditions Promote Center (PI Szanton) and she is also an advisor to the NINR Funded Palliatitve Care Research Collaborative (PI Kutner).

Carlos Roberto Jaén, M.D., Ph.D. is the Holly Distinguished Chair, Patient-Centered Medical Home, Professor and Chair of Family & Community Medicine, and Professor of Population Health at the Joe and Teresa Lozano Long School of Medicine, UT Health San Antonio. Dr. Jaén's research interests focus on improving preventive care for individuals of all ages and preventing complications from chronic diseases like diabetes, high blood pressure, and heart disease. He is passionate about

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building and studying high performance primary care offices. He served on the panels that published smoking cessation guidelines in 1996 and 2000 and was Co-Chair of the panel that published an update in May 2008. In 2005, he was appointed to the National Advisory Council of the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ) and was an appointed member of the New York State Public Health Council. He was Co-Director of the Center for Research in Family Medicine and Primary Care. The Center studied more than 500, mostly independent, primary care practices during almost 20 years. He received a Generalist Physician Faculty Scholar Award from the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation and a Cancer Control Career Development Award for Primary Care Physicians from the American Cancer Society. His interests include building a healthier San Antonio through efforts in community wellness.

Dr. Jaén has his Ph.D. in Epidemiology and Community Health from the State University of New York (SUNY) Buffalo, and his M.D. from the same university. He completed a residency in Family Medicine and a Primary Care Research Fellowship at Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland Ohio. He is a practicing family physician and has been selected to Best Doctors in America yearly since 2002. He was elected to the Delta Omega Honorary Society in Public Health in 2017 and received the 2018 Texas Academy of Family Physicians Public Health Award. He serves as Chair of the Board of Regents of the National Library of Medicine of the NIH. He was Chair of the Board of Directors of the American Board of Family Medicine in 2014 and was elected to the National Academy of Medicine of the National Academies in 2013.

Marianne Logan Fingerhood, DNP, ANP-BC is an Adult primary care Nurse Practitioner with 36 years of clinical experience and 22 years as an advanced practice nurse. She has been teaching in nursing for more than 30 years, for the last 8 years as faculty in the advanced practice NP programs. Recently she added the responsibility as the track coordinator for the Adult Gerontological Nurse Practitioner program at Johns Hopkins University School of Nursing. Her areas of interest are chronic disease management and Nurse Practitioner transition to practice. Through a grant from the Maryland Higher Education Commission she has developed a Nurse Practitioner Transition to Practice Fellowship which began in January 2021. Throughout her career Marianne has been dedicated to quality patient care and helping students move from academia to practice.

Russell S. Phillips, M.D. is Director of the Center for Primary Care and the William Applebaum Professor of Medicine and Professor of Global Health and Social Medicine at Harvard Medical School. He is a general internist at Beth Israel Deaconess Medical Center, where he provides primary care in Healthcare Associates, a large teaching practice. He has been a leader in innovation in practice and payment in primary care, implementing new care models for patients with chronic illness and, using micro-simulation, testing the impact of global payment on value. He has served on a Massachusetts Health Quality Partners Advisory Group on the future of primary care. In Massachusetts, he is advocating for access to primary care, global payment for primary care, and financial support for small, independent practices threatened by the financial strain imposed by COVID-19. He is a leader in oral health integration into primary care and served on a Patient-Centered Collaborative Advisory Committee on Oral Health Integration and is Co-Principal Investigator on a related HRSA-funded Academic Unit. Dr. Phillips has expertise in the evaluation of innovations in care, systems improvement, patient safety, and quality of care and is a member of the Center's care integration study team. In his prior work at BIDMC, which included serving as Chief of the Division of General Medicine and Primary Care for a decade, he led a task force to improve transitions in care, a working group to develop new sustainable practice models

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for primary care, and a task force to develop strategies for care management for high-risk patients. At the state level, he served on the Massachusetts Coordinating Council on the Patient-Centered Medical Home. He has championed palliative care services in primary care, wellness programs, and innovations to improve the quality of life for patients with chronic illness. A graduate of Massachusetts Institute of Technology and Stanford University School of Medicine, he has held leadership roles in the Society of General Internal Medicine, serving as Chairperson of the Research Committee, and as President of the Association of Chiefs and Leaders in General Internal Medicine. With more than 250 publications and an H-index over 110, his research has spanned disparities in care, screening for infection in office practice, patient safety, end of life care, and interventions to improve care for patients with chronic disease. He is the recipient of the two prestigious awards for mentorship at HMS; the Barger Award and the William Silen Lifetime Achievement in Mentoring Award. He led the Harvard General Medicine Fellowship Program for nearly 15 years, and the Harvard Research Fellowship Program in Integrative Medical Therapies for 12 years. He held a Mid-Career Mentorship Award (K24) from the NIH to support his mentoring activities. He has mentored more than 50 trainees, most of whom have gone on to successful careers as investigators and leaders in general medicine and in family medicine. His research has received support from the National Institutes of Health (NIH), the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ), the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, the Hartford Foundation, and the Macy Foundation. In his role as Center Director, he has authored more than 20 papers, reviews, and book chapters with a focus on the use of learning collaboratives to transform primary care, the impact of community health workers on resource use, the impact of changes in primary care practice and payment on the finances of primary care practice, and the value of primary care.

Shirley Roberson has a Bachelor Science in Health Sciences and has done extensive research in nutrition and alternative health care modalities. Beginning with patient care under Dr. Jewel Pookrum, Shirley has personally experienced the healing benefits of macrobiotic and vegetarian diets. From her own research in medical science and the latest studies, she has effectively counseled others on natural healing that includes diet, meditation, and spiritual practices. Over the years, Shirley has worked with the Hartford Church Health Ministry in the presentation of several health conferences. The Karmanos Cancer Institute frequently features Shirley as a model for patients with advanced breast cancer. Shirley is frequently sought after to participate in groups and retreats for cancer survivors and is the progenitor of the "Blue Chair" featured in the 2018 National Summit. In addition, Shirley was a graphic designer for over 20 years with her own company located in downtown Detroit, and a technical editing analyst in sales and marketing for the Ford Motor Company. Before pursuing a degree in health science and nursing, she obtained several State certifications in patient care. Shirley obtained her BS degree in Health Sciences but due to the return of stage 4 cancer she was not able to complete the degree program in nursing. Shirley has survived stage 4 cancer for 12 years.

Phillip Rodgers, M.D., F.A.A.H.P.M. is a Professor of Family Medicine and Internal Medicine at the University of Michigan, where has practiced and taught family medicine and subspecialty palliative medicine for nearly 25 years. He is founding director of the UM Palliative Care Program, and a member of the UM Institute for Health Policy and Innovation (IHPI). Dr. Rodgers has become a leading national expert in payment and care delivery innovation in palliative care, and has received numerous invitations to speak, consult and contribute technical expertise to multiple national conveners, stakeholders, and policymakers. He has also held numerous leadership positions

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within the American Academy of Hospice and Palliative Medicine (AAHPM), and led development of AAHPM's proposal for an alternative payment model for palliative care, which has been recommended for testing by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) Innovation Center. His work has been recognized with several awards including the University of Michigan Dean's Award for Community Service, the Cambia Health Foundation Sojourns Leadership Award, and the American Academy of Hospice and Palliative Medicine Gerald Holman Distinguished Service Award.

Danetta H. Sloan, PhD, MSW, MA is a Social Work Scientist who has a passion for improving health care equity for aging Black Americans. She believes that it is her Ministry to seek ways to improve health related care and access to care for Blacks through Faith-Centered initiatives. Dr. Sloan is an MSW with training in the diseases of aging. She had a 10-year journey as a medical social worker for those diagnosed with a life limiting disease in the hospital and the terminally ill in the community as a home care hospice social worker. Most of the patients and their families she worked with in hospice were diagnosed with Alzheimer's, cancer, and heart disease. She became a caregiver to her mother, diagnosed with Alzheimer's at 84 years old. Dr. Sloan received her PhD at the National Catholic School of Social Service at The Catholic University of America in Clinical Social Work. Dr. Sloan did her first post-doctoral training at the Pain and Palliative Care Service at the National Institutes of Health Clinical Center and completed a second fellowship at Johns Hopkins University. She is currently a faculty member in the Department of Health, Behavior, and Society at Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health. She continues to work on the Divine assignment to be of service to the Black Community. Her investigations involve novel approaches to increase awareness of dementia and related diseases to improve palliative and end of life care focusing on advance care planning. Dr. Sloan has several grants and honors, including the prestigious Cambia Foundation Sojourns Scholar award but none as rewarding as being a conduit for improving health care outcomes in Black communities.

Ada D. Stewart, MD, FAAFP, a family physician with Cooperative Health in Columbia, South Carolina, is president of the American Academy of Family Physicians. The AAFP represents 136,700 physicians and medical students nationwide. As AAFP president, Stewart advocates on behalf of family physicians and patients to inspire positive change in the US health care system. Stewart has been a practicing family physician with Cooperative Health, formerly Eau Claire Cooperative Health Centers, since 2012 and currently serves as lead provider and HIV specialist. A member of the AAFP since 1995, Stewart has served in several leadership positions at the state and national level. She has served on numerous commissions and committees, including as a member of the AAFP Commission on Health of the Public and Science, and past chair of the commission's Tobacco Prevention and Control Advisory Committee. Previously active in the American Medical Association, Dr. Stewart served as AAFP resident delegate to the AMA Resident and Fellow Section and was chair of the AMA Minority Affairs Consortium Governing Council. Born and reared in an underserved urban area of Cleveland, Ohio, Stewart has committed her career to ensuring uninsured and low-income families have access to high quality

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health care. She began her career as a National Health Service Corps scholar, caring for underserved patients in rural South Carolina. She continues to work with underserved communities in both rural and urban settings. From 2003 to 2012, Stewart served as chief medical officer and HIV specialist at the Richland Community Health Care Association in Eastover and Columbia, South Carolina. She was recognized in 2017 for her dedicated service in hepatitis C treatment and prevention by the South Carolina HIV/AIDS Council. She was recognized in April 2018 by the South Carolina Chapter of the National Coalition of 100 Black Women, with the Health Award in recognition of her contributions to the health of the community in Columbia. Stewart was recently named to the Presidential Advisory Council on HIV/AIDS. In the aftermath of Sept. 11, 2001, Stewart enlisted in the U.S. Army Reserves and has achieved the rank of Colonel. She is a preceptor for nurse practitioners, medical residents and medical students, and has received numerous awards, including the Alpha Omega Alpha Honor Medical Society 2012 Volunteer Clinical Faculty Award for her precepting at the University of South Carolina School of Medicine. She also conducts continuing education programs relating to HIV, Health Disparities, Hospice and Palliative Medicine and Hepatitis C. Stewart earned her Bachelor of Science degree in pharmacy from Ohio Northern University in Ada, Ohio. Realizing she wanted to have a more direct impact on patients' lives and well-being, she returned to school, completing her medical degree at the Medical College of Ohio and her family medicine residency training at Palmetto Richland Memorial Hospital in Columbia, South Carolina. Stewart has also earned additional certification in HIV care from the American Academy of HIV Medicine and is certified as a hospice medical director by the Hospice Medical Director Certification Board. Stewart is board certified by the American Board of Family Medicine. She has the AAFP Degree of Fellow, an earned degree awarded to family physicians for distinguished service and continuing medical education. On February 16, 2021, Stewart was honored by the South Carolina House of Representatives with Resolution H. 3894 in recognition of her service to the community, our country and her specialty as part of their celebration of Black History Month.

Martha L. Twaddle MD, FACP, FAAHPM, HMDC combines nearly thirty years of experience in the care of seriously ill people and their families in a variety of areas of service. She currently serves as the Waud Family Medical Director for Palliative Medicine & Supportive Care at Northwestern Medicine. Her academic work includes developing curriculum, guidelines and models of care for healthcare professionals to provide care for the seriously ill in all settings. She works with others at Northwestern Feinberg School of Medicine exploring how technology and also prescriptive nature can improve health outcomes as well as collaborating nationally in the development of patientfamily centered quality metrics. On behalf of the American Academy of Hospice & Palliative Medicine (AAHPM), Dr. Twaddle served as the Co-Chair for the National Consensus Project for Quality Palliative Care, which completed the 4th edition of the clinical practice guidelines for the field in late October 2018. Dr. Twaddle's unique talents and contributions to the field of Palliative Medicine have helped increase the understanding of and access to this continuum of care, regionally and nationally. In 2013, she was named one of the 30 most influential visionaries in Hospice and Palliative Medicine by nomination of her peers via the AAHPM. She served as President of the AAHPM from 2002-2003 and on the AAHPM Board of Directors from 1997-2004. She represented the AAHPM in the creation of the initial NCP Guidelines published in 2004. Integrating Serious Illness Care into Primary Care Delivery: A Workshop Planning Committee Biosketches

Phillip Rodgers, M.D., F.A.A.H.P.M. (Co-Chair) is a Professor of Family Medicine and Internal Medicine at the University of Michigan, where has practiced and taught family medicine and subspecialty palliative medicine for nearly 25 years. He is founding director of the UM Palliative Care Program, and a member of the UM Institute for Health Policy and Innovation (IHPI). Dr. Rodgers has become a leading national expert in payment and care delivery innovation in palliative care, and has received numerous invitations to speak, consult and contribute technical expertise to multiple national conveners, stakeholders, and policymakers. He has also held numerous leadership positions within the American Academy of Hospice and Palliative Medicine (AAHPM), and led development of AAHPM's proposal for an alternative payment model for palliative care, which has been recommended for testing by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) Innovation Center. His work has been recognized with several awards including the University of Michigan Dean's Award for Community Service, the Cambia Health Foundation Sojourns Leadership Award, and the American Academy of Hospice and Palliative Medicine Gerald Holman Distinguished Service Award.

Patricia M. Davidson, PhD, MED, RN, FAAN (Co-Chair) Across her career, Dr. Davidson has been committed to developing innovative, person-centered models of care. She has been a registered nurse for four decades and has clinical, teaching and practice expertise in cardiovascular science and the care of vulnerable populations, particularly those with chronic and complex conditions. As Dean and Professor of the Johns Hopkins School of Nursing, she is strongly involved in doctoral education and strongly committed to mentorship of new investigators. She is committed to diversity, equity, inclusion and workforce development and interdisciplinary practice. To promote these values, she currently serves as the Secretary General of the Secretariat of the World Health Organizations Collaborating Centers for Nursing and Midwifery, and Counsel General of the International Council on Women's Health Issues. She is a member of Sigma Theta Tau International's Institute for Global Healthcare Leadership Advisory Board and a Board Member of the Consortium of Universities for Global Health. She also serves on the Board of Health Care Services for the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine. Throughout her career she has been devoted to mentoring the next generation of health professionals and scientists. Across her career she has mentored 43 pre-doctoral and 15 post doctoral trainees. She has also been actively involved in mentorship of early career researchers and nurse scientists. In 2016 she was the first nurse to receive the Australian Museum Eureka Prize for Outstanding Mentor of Young Researchers, the most prestigious research mentorship award in Australia. Dr. Davidson has over 550 publications in Scopus. Her H -Index is 45 (Scopus) and 66 in Google Scholar and i-10 Index is 385 and she has published 32 book chapters. Many of these publications are with students, mentees, clinical collaborators and fellow nurse scientists. Over her career she has received funding as prinicipal investigator from the National Institutes of Health, the National Health & Medical Research Council (NIH Equivalent Australia), Australian Research Council (NSF Equivalent Australia). She also currently serves as the Co-Director of the Enrichment Core for the NINR P30 Promoting Resilience in Persons with Multiple Chronic Conditions Promote Center (PI Szanton) and she is also an advisor to the NINR Funded Palliatitve Care Research Collaborative (PI Kutner).

Claire Ankuda, MD, is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Geriatrics and Palliative Medicine at the Icahn School of Medicine at Mount Sinai. A Vermonter, she earned an MD from the

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University of Vermont and a MPH from the Harvard School of Public Health before going to the University of Washington for family medicine residency. She was then a Robert Wood Johnson Clinical Scholar at the University of Michigan during which time she conducted a 6-month policy externship at the Center for Medicare & Medicaid Innovation. Following this, she completed a Palliative Medicine fellowship at Mount Sinai. Dr. Ankuda is a health services researcher who aims to assess the impact of payment policies and health systems on outcomes for seriously ill older adults and their families.

Lori Bishop, MHA, BSN, RN is a healthcare nurse executive focused on innovative and transformational interdisciplinary care delivery models for the vulnerable seriously ill population. Lori has an extensive clinical background in hospice and palliative care. Her current position is Vice President of Palliative and Advanced Care at NHPCO. Previously, Lori was the Chief Advanced Illness Management (AIM) Executive for Sutter Health serving an average daily census of 2500 seriously ill patients across Northern California. Under her leadership, the Sutter Health AIM program reduced total program cost by 13% two consecutive years while achieving full performance for quality metrics. In 2017, she restructured the program including widespread implementation of primary palliative care in home health; implemented a standard palliative care patient satisfaction survey through a national vendor; implemented daily huddle, bi-weekly case conference, and monthly care conference leveraging patient level data to drive performance and care coordination. AlM received the inaugural Vanguard Award from the California Hospital Quality Institute in 2016. In her previous executive role at UnityPoint Health, Lori facilitated the creation of a system-wide palliative care program across care settings by developing standard clinical, operational, satisfaction, and financial metrics across sites of service. The system-wide integrated Palliative Care program received the prestigious Circle of Life Award in 2013. The team enhanced and optimized the electronic health record to pull clinical data for metric reporting and shared their build with other Epic users.

Jon Broyles, M.Sc has been the executive director of C-TAC since 2010. He oversees day-to-day operations and sets strategy. Jon has the benefit of drawing on hundreds of innovators' experience and talent in the Coalition. His role is channeling these resources into practical approaches to improve care for those living with advanced illness. Jon received his M.Sc in Philosophy from the University of Edinburgh.

Karen Bullock, PhD, LCSW is Professor and Head of the Department of Social Work at North Carolina State University, in the College of Humanities and Social Sciences. She earned her PhD in Sociology and Social Work from Boston University, her Master's degree in Social Work, from Columbia University, and her Bachelor of Social Work degree from North Carolina State University. She is Affiliate Faculty at the Institute for Collaboration on Health, Intervention, and Policy (InCHIP) at the University of Connecticut. Dr. Bullock has more than 20 years of clinical practice experience in mental health and aging, with interests and expertise in health care disparities and end-of-life care issues. She is a John A. Hartford Faculty Scholar and serves on several national boards and committees, including Social Work Hospice & Palliative Care Network (SWHPN), the American Cancer Society (ACS) Oncology Social Work Research Peer Review Committee, and is current Chair of the NASW Mental Health Section Committee. Dr. Bullock's research focuses on cancer care and social support for older adults with non-curable illnesses. Her article on The Influence of Culture on End-of-Life Decision Making, won the 2012 Best Article Award by the Routledge Journal of Social Work in End-of-Life & Palliative Care. She has been a leading force in advancing social work

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practice, education, and training in gerontology, mental health, palliative and end-of-life care. In addition, Dr. Bullock he has been quoted in the Washington Post, USA Today and LA Times as an expert in these areas. Dr. Bullock has published and presented nationally and internationally on these topics. She was a Visiting Scholar at the Mailman School of Public Health at Columbia University and previously held appointments at the Institute of Living/Hartford Hospital, the University of Connecticut, Salem State College, Smith College, and UNC-Wilmington.

Deborah J. Cohen, PhD Deborah Cohen, Ph.D., has been developing her skills in qualitative methods for more than 20 years, and has spent more than a decade studying primary care practices, with a focus on clinician-patient communication, practice change and improvement and health information technology use. Dr. Cohen has expertise in a range of qualitative methods and approaches, including interviewing, observation, and conversation analysis. Dr. Cohen is a highly skilled analyst, and she has experience supervising qualitative teams in data collection, management and analysis of qualitative and mixed methods data.

He also has an appointment as an Associate Professor in the Department of Family and Community Medicine at the University of Kentucky, where he provides direct clinical care and teaches students and residents. Dr. Peterson, a native of Utah, received his medical and graduate degrees from Case Western Reserve University in Cleveland, Ohio and completed his family medicine residency at the Trident/Medical University of South Carolina family medicine residency program. Dr. Peterson leads a research team focused on elucidating the outcomes of Family Medicine Certification, in particular the impact that certification activities have on the quality of care delivered by family physicians. Dr. Peterson has authored over 100 peer reviewed publications and made over 100 national / international conference presentations.

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Tammie Quest, MD, is the Director of the Emory Palliative Care Center for Emory's Woodruff Health Sciences Center. She is Professor in the Department of Emergency Medicine, and Division of Geriatrics and Gerontology at the Emory University School of Medicine and board certified in Emergency Medicine and Hospice and Palliative Medicine. Dr. Quest is a Project on Death in America Faculty Scholar. Currently, she serves as the Chief of the Section of Palliative Medicine at the Atlanta VA Medical Center and is the former director of the Grady Cancer Center for Excellence Palliative Care Oncology Program. She is currently the Fellowship Program Director for the Emory University School of Medicine program in Hospice and Palliative Medicine and holds a strong interest in novel palliative care curriculum design and teaching methodologies for both undergraduate, graduate and post-graduate medical trainees that she teaches locally, regionally and nationally. Dr. Quest is the Director of the NCI sponsored Education in Palliative and End of Life Care-Emergency Medicine (EPEC-EM) Project. She serves as a member of the National Priorities Partnership's Palliative and End-of-life Care work group. With a strong interest in ethics and end of life care, she holds a core faculty appointment at the Emory University Center for Ethics and she is the immediate past-Chair of the Ethics Committee for the Society of Academic Emergency Medicine and a member of the ethics committee for the American College of Emergency Physicians. In 2016, she was appointed by Governor Nathan Deal to the Georgia Palliative Care and Quality of Life Advisory Council. She is also president-elect of the American Academy of Hospice and Palliative Medicine.
