

# Data Collection and Analysis

## **GEORGIA (HB 1013, 2022)**

- Established Behavioral Health Care Workforce Database.
  - Create, house and provide information to the Governor, General Assembly, state agencies and the public.
  - Seek federal or other sources of funding to create and maintain the database.
  - Create and maintain an online dashboard.
  - Establish a minimum data set survey.

## **ILLINOIS (HB 4306, 2022)**

- Established Holistic Mental Health Care for Youth in Care Task Force.
  - Assess the capacity of state licensed mental health professionals to provide preventative mental health to youth in care.
  - Review the current payment rates for providers serving youth in care, the process for smaller private practices and agencies to bill through managed care, and delayed payments to mental health providers.
  - Evaluate the recruitment and retention of health care providers who are persons of color to serve youth in care.

## **COLORADO**

- HB 1274 (2015) established the Career Pathways for Students for Critical Occupations in Growing Industries program.
- Program focused on <u>behavioral health</u> occupations in 2019-2020.

#### **INDIANA**

- SB 223 (2018) required data during licensure renewal processes.
- <u>Ivy Tech Community College</u>, established a Certified Nursing Assistant bridge program.

## **NEBRASKA**

- <u>Nebraska Rural Health Opportunity Programs and Kearney Health</u>
   <u>Opportunity Programs</u>
- LB 792 (2022) provided ongoing annual funding through 2025.



# Licensure: Interstate Compact Models

See CSG's report: Occupational Interstate Compacts in Action (July 2019)

## **EXPEDITED LICENSURE MODEL**

- "Check the box"
  - Applicants are licensed in one state.
  - Applicants request a license from each state in which they intend to practice.
- Considerations:
  - Streamlined application process with consistent requirements.
  - A central entity maintains applicant credentials.
  - Licensees typically bear the costs of licensure in multiple states.
  - Licensees must maintain each state's renewal process and continuing education requirements.

## **MUTUAL RECOGNITION MODEL**

- Authority to practice
  - Licensees are authorized to practice in any participating compact states.
- Considerations:
  - Licensee applies for licensure in principal state only.
  - Licensees are bound to the renewal and continuing education requirements of the state in which they reside.
  - Licensees must apply for a new license if they relocate to another state within the compact.

# Licensure: Reciprocity and Endorsement



# Maryland, Virginia and Washington D.C.

Entered into an agreement to establish reciprocity through an expedited licensure process for physicians licensed in all three jurisdictions.



# <u>Hawaii</u>

Streamlined licensure process for physicians who hold a current, active license in a jurisdiction that requires substantially equivalent to or greater than the qualifications for licensure in Hawaii.



# South Dakota (<u>SB 76</u>, 2023)

Temporary license, certificate or registration for providers who are satisfying the requirements for licensure by endorsement as determined by the board.

# Licensure: Trainees and Graduates

## **ARKANSAS**

Ark. Code Ann. §17-27-101

# **License Associate Counselor or Marriage and Family Therapist**

- Receive a graduate degree.
- Complete graduate semester hours.
- Pass written, oral and situational examinations.
- Submit a supervision agreement.
- Pass criminal background check.
- Be a citizen of the U.S. or have an immigration green card.

## **DELAWARE**

Del. Code Ann. tit. 24 §3030

# Licensed Associate Counselor of Mental Health

- Effective for two years.
- Meet all requirements for licensed professional counselors of mental health, except requirements for experience.
- Submit a plan for professional direct supervision.

## **RHODE ISLAND**

R.I. Code Regs. tit. 216 §40-05-11

# **Clinical Mental Health Counselor Associate**

- Receive a graduate degree.
- Complete an educational practicum and internship.

# **Supervising Behavioral Health Specialist**

- Be licensed for at least 5 years.
- Complete a graduate course in supervision.
- Complete a national supervisor certification.
- Have at least 2 years of supervising experience.

# Scope of Practice: Baccalaureate Behavioral Health Occupations

## **UTAH**

- <u>SB 16</u> (2022) established the Office of Professional Licensure Review.
- <u>Proposed</u> a 1-year Behavioral Health Technician certification and bachelor's level generalist license.
- <u>SB 26</u> (2024) establishing the Behavioral Health Board.
  - Creates an alternative pathway to certain licensures.
  - Expands the scope of practice for social service workers and advanced substance use disorder counselors.

## **VIRGINIA**


- <u>SB 403 (2024)</u> established two new licensed occupations:
  - Behavioral health technician
  - Behavioral health technician assistant
- Requires supervision by a licensed mental health professional.

# Scope of Practice: Prior Authorization

PRIOR AUTHORIZATION REQUIREMENTS FOR PROVIDERS PRESCRIBING



- Prohibits or limits the use of prior authorization for buprenorphinecontaining products
- The state Medicaid program or private insurers determine prior authorization requirements
- Information is not currently available

#### **STATE EXAMPLES:**

#### **OREGON**

- An insurer may not require prior authorization during the first 60 days of treatment.
- Medicaid plans may not require prior authorization for the first 30 days of MAT.

## **TENNESSEE**

 Requirements are up to the discretion of the state Medicaid program or private insurance company.



# Scope of Practice: Licensed Professional Counselor Ability to Diagnose

#### **STATE EXAMPLES:**

#### **MAINE**

<u>LPCs are prohibited from diagnosing patients.</u>


#### **MONTANA**

<u>LPCs may conduct</u>
 <u>assessments and diagnoses</u> to establish treatment goals and objectives.

#### **NEW JERSEY**

• <u>Diagnostic ability is not</u> outlined in statute.
