CLASSIFICATIONS OF CHILDREN

- Missing Child vs. Separated Child vs. Unaccompanied Child
 - » A missing child is a person younger than 18 whose whereabouts are unknown to a legal guardian.

(As defined under federal law 42 U.S.C. § 5772)

» A separated child is a child who is separated from both parents or from his/her previous legal or customary primary caregiver, but not necessarily from other relatives.

(As defined in FEMA's Post Disaster Reunification of Children: A Nationwide Approach)

» An unaccompanied child is a child who has been separated from both parents and other relatives and is not being cared for by an adult who, by law or custom, is responsible for doing so.

(As defined in FEMA's Post Disaster Reunification of Children: A Nationwide Approach)



NCMEC'S ROLE IN HURRICANE KATRINA

During Hurricane Katrina NCMEC was requested to assist in:

- Establishing a hotline to handle calls about missing children (handled 34,045)
 - » Helped resolved the 5,192 missing children cases reported to NCMEC
 - » Now federally mandated and known as the National Emergency Child Locator Center (NECLC)
- Providing field support to help find missing children/ family members and identify unaccompanied minors



In 2006, the Post-Katrina Emergency Management Reform Act (PKEMRA) included plans to better prepare recovery teams to reunify families



HURRICANE KATRINA: EVACUATION PHASE

- More than 1.5m people evacuated (incl. 200,000 children)
 - Families were separated during evacuation.
 - Lack of planning around vulnerable populations, including children.
- Children were without their parents on evacuation buses.
 - No tracking system used to verify people at embarkation/debarkation points.
 - o Buses headed in different directions to state-managed emergency shelters.







HURRICANE KATRINA: RESPONSE PHASE

- Photos were the quickest way to locate the missing.
- Technology in 2005, was not as robust as it is current day.
- Many families who evacuated did not have cell phones or photos of their missing child.
 - Creativity was key = school photos
- Reuniting families was challenging as many families were in constant motion from state to state to try and find each other.



NCMEC'S ROLE IN DISASTER PREPAREDNESS & RESPONSE

❖ PREPAREDNESS

 NCMEC can provide disaster reunification planning resources for child-serving organizations and agencies and encourages states to develop disaster reunification plan with the written inclusion of NCMEC resources.



*RESPONSE:

- NCMEC responds to requests by a disaster-impacted state or through FEMA to support reunification efforts for children separated from their parents/caregivers.
 - Field Resources: Team Adam Consultants (TACs)
 - o Call Center: National Emergency Child Locator Center (NECLC)
 - Online Tool: Unaccompanied Minors Registry (UMR)
 - Other NCMEC resources: Posters, Family Advocacy, Forensics/Biometrics collection, etc.







NATIONAL EMERGENCY CHILD LOCATOR CENTER

- Operates during presidentially declared disasters when missing children are a concern
- Bilingual staff and access to over 190 languages
- Referrals: NGOs & reunification partners






UNACCOMPANIED MINORS REGISTRY

- The UMR is the first national data collection tool used to:
 - Facilitate the tracking and reunification of unaccompanied minors as a result of a disaster.
 - Expedite the reunification of unaccompanied minors with their families, guardians and caregivers when separated by a disaster.
 - Provide reports back to law enforcement and reunification staff.




