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

- As a community, we need to better collect and organization of existing data






Compendium Demonstration

- 5x conclusions:
 - 1. There are very few disaster health data sources.
 - 2. Disaster data are less represented than auxiliary data.
 - 3. Disaster data sources are generally limited to one time period.
 - 4. Interoperability is lacking.
 - 5. Leapfrogging is a viable path forward.
