
**Ethics, Integrity, and Accountability:** Directing our focus and uncompromising standards to the needs of everyone with disabilities, especially people who are most marginalized.

### Persons with disabilities experience health inequities

Many of them:



Are likely to die 20 years earlier



Experience poorer health - having more than double the risk of developing conditions such as diabetes, stroke or depression



Have more limitations in functioning - for example inaccessible health facilities are up to 6 times more hindering for them



Health inequities arise from unfair conditions that affect persons with disabilities disproportionally. These conditions are part of the socioeconomic and political context, social determinants of health, risk factors, and health system barriers

Investing in health equity for persons with disabilities means investing in Health for All, bringing high dividends to individuals and communities






# United Nations Early Warnings for All Initiative



The Early Warnings for All initiative is a groundbreaking effort to ensure everyone on Earth is protected from hazardous weather, water, or climate events through lifesaving early warning systems by the end of 2027.







The Early Warnings for All initiative is built on four pillars to support countries in building and operating effective and inclusive multi-hazard early warning systems:

- •Disaster risk knowledge led by the <u>United Nations</u> <u>Office for Disaster Risk Reduction (UNDRR)</u>
- Detection, observation, monitoring, analysis, and forecasting - led by the <u>World Meteorological</u> <u>Organization (WMO)</u>
- •Warning dissemination and communication led by the <u>International Telecommunication Union (ITU)</u>
- •Preparedness and response capabilities led by the <u>International Federation of Red Cross and Red</u> <u>Crescent Societies (IFRC)</u>
