
Health Equity

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



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









TREE CANOPY





TREE PLANTING

- •1 acre of new forest will sequester about 2.5tons of carbon annually
- Prevents or reduces soil erosion and water pollution
- •Helps recharge groundwater and stream flow
- •Shade from trees cools hot streets and parking lots, "cities are heat islands" that are 5-9 degrees hotter than surrounding areas
- •Windbreaks around homes can be shields against wind and snow and reduce heating.cost by as much as 30%





Authentic engagement

The goal should be to get to the point of co-creation with the local neighborhood this should include new and existing residents.

Too often, the community is informed of its issues & needs, rather than being asked what those issues and needs are...





what are the root causes of this issue?

why is it more prevalent among one segment of the population versus another?

what are the social, environmental, and economic factors that contribute to making this condition a public health issue?

why is it prevalent in one location verses another?

A Planning Approach for addressing Health Issues in Cleveland

Determine Condition	Where is the condition most prevalent	Identify and Understand The Social Determinant (root cause)	Identify the appropriate Intervention utilizing community level input	Assess the impact	Who is being impacted the most
Pre Condition What are the pre- existing health conditions prior to intervention ? (Obesity)	Determine if this condition is more prevalent in one location vs. another	External (Place) (social, environment al, & economic conditions) Internal (People) Personal behavior Genes	Bike paths, walkable neighborhood s, community gardens, recreation facilities, diet and exercise, changes in public policies , and strategic investments	Post Condition What are the post health conditions after the intervention?	Are there significant differences among segments of the population?
