History of Inner City Struggle



### History of Inner City Struggle

- 1990's: Moms organizing to decrease gang violence
- 2000's: Move to educational justice



ICS youth leaders with the support of co-founder Luis Sánchez launch the Schools Not Jails statewide campaign to defeat the anti-youth initiative Proposition 21 and to demand culturally-relevant curriculum in California schools. The campaign inspires a modern day movement of young people throughout California and nationwide to challenge the school-to-jail pipeline, disproportionately affecting youth of color.


#### Focus of Educational Justice

- Culturally-relevant curriculum
- College Prep Courses
  - Equal access to A-G college prep curriculum
- New Schools
  - 2004: Building new schools in East LA for the first time in 80 years
  - Reduction of class size in overcrowded schools

#### Focus on Restorative Justice

- Elimination of punitive discipline policies
- School Climate Bill of Rights
- Restorative Justice Coordinator in schools

# What We Learned from Students




# Lesson on Stereotypes

- Opportunity to personalize stereotypes with the stand-up exercise
- Acknowledging stereotypes
- Thinking about what effect stereotypes have and what actions can be taken

#### Other Lessons

- Success of program was that it provided opportunity to address issues AND self improvement
- Leadership skill development—speaking up, public speaking,
- Increased awareness of issues that affected their lives
- Language matters (e.g. Stipend; Push out)
