

Acknowledgement from offender and community


Vindication: Community expression of disapproval

Safety: Misconduct must not be repeated





Removal from Housing, Suspension, Expulsion, Degree Revocation, Decharter Student Organizations

Warning, Probation, Loss of Privileges, Fine, Transcript Notation

Reparative Dialogue, Climate Circles, Education, Treatment, Service, Restitution, Voluntary Leave, Safety planning, Circles of Support and Accountability

Prevention Education, Community-Building Circles, Dialogue Skills Incapacitation



- Banners, dance floors, social media


Direct Victimization
