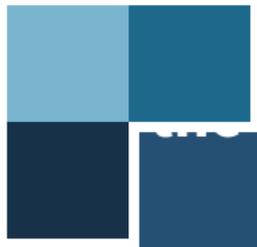

- 2012-now: Synthesis, fund **University Centers of Exemplary Mentoring**



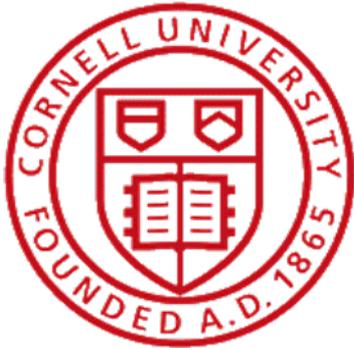

# What is AP Mentoring?

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- ▶ AP Mentoring is an **online teacher-to-teacher support program** for teachers of all experience levels.
- ▶ The program **connects AP teachers looking to develop their practice with expert AP teachers** who get great results in the classroom.
- ▶ In 2016-17 we have offered AP Mentoring to teachers of AP English Literature & Composition and AP United States History
- ▶ For the 2017-18 school year, AP Mentoring will be offered in:
  - ▶ AP Computer Science Principles
  - ▶ AP English Literature & Composition
  - ▶ AP United States History

# Why Is AP Mentoring important?

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- ▶ Research shows that coaching or mentorship can be a powerful form of sustained professional development for increasing teacher effectiveness\*
- ▶ Multiple data on AP teachers highlights the need for sustained forms of professional development not currently offered by the College Board:
  - ▶ One-third of AP teachers have been teaching AP for 3 years or less
  - ▶ 35% learn they will be teaching AP less than three months before the school year starts
  - ▶ 73% of AP teachers currently attend an AP Summer Institute, which provides induction without any follow-up
- ▶ Online mentoring provides opportunities for teachers across the country to receive feedback and coaching, including teachers in remote or rural areas who may not have access to face-to-face professional development

# How is the AP Mentoring program structured?

---

- ▶ Mentees choose an available AP mentor in their subject and join one of that mentor's groups of up to four mentees.
- ▶ Each group meets online monthly through video chat, completing 12 hour-long sessions over the course of the school year.
- ▶ Mentees are active participants. They work with their mentors to set goals and to analyze and modify their own teaching practices.
- ▶ In between sessions mentees complete a reflection assignment designed to help them apply what they're learning in the classroom.
- ▶ The group uses an online platform to share documents and schedule sessions.

# What are the benefits of AP Mentoring?

---

- ▶ **Professional development support** no matter where teachers live and work. The online format makes the program especially useful for those who can't make it to on-site trainings.
- ▶ **Meaningful collaboration** with other educators who teach the same AP subject.
- ▶ **Personalized feedback** that can be applied in the classroom right away.
- ▶ Mentees receive **2.2 continuing education units** for successful completion of the program and may also meet district-mandated professional development requirements.
- ▶ Schools and districts can **strengthen and/or expand their AP programs** by building the capacity of their current AP teachers and supporting the addition of AP CSP, AP English Lit, and/or AP U.S. History.

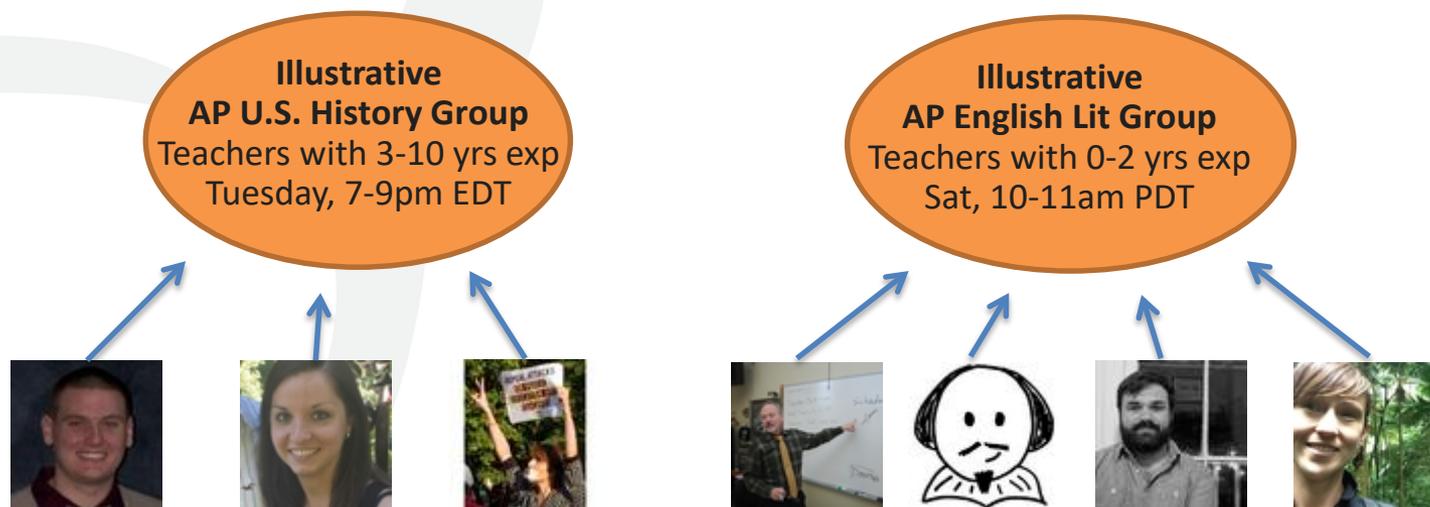

# The Mentor-Mentee Matching Process

- ▶ In 2016-17, APM staff matched mentees and mentors based on time zone, schedule, experience, and area of interest
- ▶ For 2017-18, mentees will choose their own mentoring group based on time zone, meeting time, experience, and mentor statement



# Technology platform: Video chat tool

## Goal of a video chat tool

- ▶ Allows mentors and mentees to chat in “real time”
- ▶ Video component allows for a personal connection

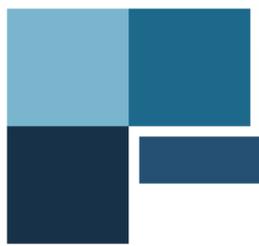

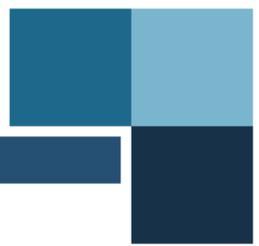

- ▶ Sequencing skills and scaffolding texts to engage students and build proficiency
- ▶ Recognizing how text organization and structure contribute to a text's overall meaning
- ▶ Analyzing how writers use literary devices and techniques to convey thematic ideas
