"Special Relationships"

- Dzung Duy Nguyen v. Massachusetts Institute of Technology, 96 N.E.3d 128 (Mass. Supreme Judicial Court. 2018) (Nguyen, a graduate student with past suicide attempts sought university help with "test-taking problems" over a two-year period and subsequently died by suicide.)
 - "Reasonable measures by the university to satisfy a triggered duty will include initiating its suicide prevention protocol if the university has developed such a protocol." Nguyen v. MIT at 24.
- Regents of University of California v. Superior Court, 413 P.3d. 656 (Cal. Supreme Court 2018) (Rosen, a state university student was attacked and severely injured (stabbed) in a chemistry laboratory by a fellow student who had been treated by the university for serious mental health issues.)

- Impact of The Jed Foundation (JED)
- "One resource that provides universities with guidance for drafting is Jed Foundation's Framework for Developing Institutional Protocols for the Acutely Distressed or Suicidal College Student." Nguyen v. MIT at 24 n.18.
