Symposium Objectives: Resuming more normal activities in the midst of the COVID-19 pandemic poses significant challenges to American society, and particular challenges to Black Americans, who are disproportionately harmed by the virus as well as by the suspension of educational and economic activities caused by COVID-19. This symposium aims to serve as a fact-finding and information-sharing exercise covering two critical topics. In the first part of the program, speakers and other participants will explore the anticipated trajectory of vaccine and treatment development- the science behind these technologies, how they will be delivered equitably to Black communities, and how trust will be built in these communities to insure distribution. The second part of the symposium will explore issues related to the resumption of organized athletic activities, where much discussion has focused on intercollegiate and professional athletics. Blacks constitute a significant percentage of elite athletes in a number of sports and speakers will address particular issues facing those returning to sports participation.
