The guidance will:


- Promote a common understanding of resilience
- Help everyone understand and fulfill their critical roles related to increasing resilience
- Address the relationship between shocks and stressors and how they affect resilience
- Inspire fresh, forward-looking, and people-centered approaches

Stakeholder Engagement – Whole Community Sessions

- Conducted 6 Resilience Listening Sessions and a Resilient Nation Partnership Network Listening Session with 680+ whole community stakeholders
- Conducted engagement discussion at the National Governors Association ResCon, Youth Preparedness Council Summit, FEMA's National Preparedness Symposium and the International Association of Emergency Managers annual conference with 200+ attendees
- Conducted an Economic Resilience Listening Session with Economic Development Administration and National Association of Development Organizations with 30+ attendees and a Philanthropic Listening Session with 15+ attendees
- Briefed on the NRG during Natural Hazards Workshop, 12th Annual Building Resilience Conference and the National Homeland Security Conference.
- Participated in a tribal focused technical assistance workshop hosted by the Cherokee Nation of Oklahoma in Catoosa, OK in July 2023. Participants included Tribal Nation members and FEMA Tribal representatives from FEMA Region VI. Conducted a Tribal Listening Session with representatives from 16 Tribal Nations in October 2023.
- Conducted 80+ individual stakeholder meetings to date with 25+ SLTT and non-Governmental Organizations and 25+ Federal Groups, including the first Joint Federal Leadership Group Session, representing over 60 departments and agencies and over 300 partners.

Resilience Principles and Definition

All Threats and Hazards:

Identify, prepare for, resist, and respond to shocks and stressors, prioritizing through risk-informed approaches those that represent the greatest risks.

Human-Centered:

Position the well-being of individuals, families, communities, and society at the center of resilience goals, taking into consideration the needs of all community members, including those that are most vulnerable and have been underserved and/or historically marginalized.

Adaptive:

Adapt innovative solutions to new conditions and knowledge, continuously growing and enhancing the capability to resist, respond, and bounce forward from evolving threats and hazards.

Collaborative:

Seek input that engages and empowers the public, private, academic, and non-profit sectors, reflects shared commitment, and utilizes transparent processes, metrics, and goals for data-driven decision-making.

Equitable:

Increase access to services and benefits to underserved and historically marginalized or disadvantaged communities that often bear a disproportionate burden of impacts.

Sustainable:

Implement solutions that serve current and future needs by considering the entire life-cycle of solutions.

Interdependent:

Apply risk-informed approaches that account for the complexity and interdependencies of systems, prioritizing solutions and investments that address a range of objectives and enhance resilience over the long-term.

Resilience: The ability to prepare for threats and hazards, adapt to changing conditions, and withstand and recover rapidly from adverse conditions and disruptions. **(DRAFT)**

 - **Financing Resilience Efforts:** Describe potential successful models for financing resilience priorities
 - **Measuring Resilience:** Explain the importance of metrics and approaches for measuring resilience




