85% of TMCF's firstgeneration scholars continue from their first to their second year of college; the national average is only 66%. TMCF awarded 53% of its scholarships to first generation students



Covers tuition, fees and oncampus room and board for all classifications of students.

Capacity Building Support

- The average non-HBCU institution had seven times the endowment value of the average HBCU. (2018-2019).
- Average four-year non-HBCU institution has around \$1.25 in endowment funding for every \$1 in their budget, while the average four-year HBCU only has about 50 cents for every \$1.7


Institutional Advancement
