
Anthropology and Open Scholarship

AmericanAnthro's history

- Established in 1902 (flagship journal from 1888)
- 8000 members in 96 countries
- Archaeology, Linguistic, Biological, Cultural domains

Our future is open

- Strategic priority: a more accountable organization with support for equitable and inclusive knowledge production / distribution
- How we build that pathway to the future involves experimentation, monitoring and evaluation, and alliances





Societies' Role in Advancing Open Scholarship

- Activating our 'super powers'
 - Convening
 - Standards setting
 - Voice and Illumination
- Enhancing membership value proposition
 - Our ask: work with us on models that position us (and our sister societies) to deliver open scholarship services and guidance



Cross-Sector Possibilities: Incentives

- Incentives for change
 - Society track record in discipline-specific guidance
 - Lessons learned:
 - Collaboration with department leaders and higher-ups needed
 - One size does not fit all







Cross-Sector Possibilities: Training

Data Sharing

- Developing discipline-specific guidance
 - Ethical considerations
 - Variable record formats across a sprawling intellectual terrain
- Support needed for uptake, going to scale
