National, non-profit, independent professional certification board



Established to promote highest standards of practice for medicolegal death investigators



Accredited by the Forensic Specialties Accreditation Board (FSAB) in 2005. Reaccredited in 2010, 2015, and 2020.

Purpose

- Encourage adherence to high standards of professional and ethical conduct when conducting medicolegal death investigations
- Recognize qualified individuals who have voluntarily applied for basic and advanced levels of professional certification
- Grant and issue certificates to individuals who have demonstrated their mastery of investigational techniques and who have successfully completed rigorous examination of their knowledge and skills in the field of medicolegal death investigation.

Goal


 Promote the highest standards of practice for medicolegal death investigators



ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

- Voluntary Board of Directors including five Officers
- A diverse Advisory Council consisting of representation of Medical Examiner and Coroner offices from different jurisdictions

CERTIFICATION

- Registry Certification
 - Associate status or
 - Diplomate status

- Board Certification
 - Fellow status

Registry Certification

 Initial certification that provides official recognition that an individual has acquired basic knowledge and demonstrated proficiency in the standards of practice necessary to properly conduct a thorough medicolegal death investigation

- Two tracks
 - Associate (A-ABMDI)
 - Diplomate (D-ABMDI)



REGISTRY CERTIFICATION



At least 18 years of age



High school diploma or equivalent



Currently employed by a Medical Examiner/Coroner office with the job responsibility to independently conduct medicolegal death investigations, or supervise such investigations



At least 640 hours of experience or points

REGISTRY ASSOCIATE, A-ABMDI



Independently completes an investigative report and all other facets of medicolegal death investigation, other than scene investigation.



To "supervise such investigations" means the applicant must have prior experience conducting medicolegal death investigations.

REGISTRY DIPLOMATE, D-ABMDI



Independently conducts medicolegal death scene investigations, in person on location at the death scene. This includes but is not limited to:

- completing a body examination (documenting injuries and personally assessing postmortem changes.
- photographing the scene
- completing an investigative report



To "supervise such investigations" means the applicant must have prior experience conducting medicolegal death investigations.

HOW TOOBTAIN 640 POINTS

- Full or part time employment, one hour = one point
- On-call employment
 - Diplomate: MINIMUM 100 points required from deaths with scene investigation
- Advanced degree
- Education/Training
- Viewing autopsies

Fundamental Tasks of Medicolegal Death Investigation



Signed Code of Ethics and Conduct



240 multiple choice examination, up to 4 hours

- Interagency Communication
- Communication with Families
- Scene Response and Documentation
- Body Assessment and Documentation
- Completing the Investigation
- Additional Medicolegal Death Investigator Duties
- Forensic and Medical Knowledge

Board Certification

- Experienced Registry Diplomate medicolegal death investigators who prove their mastery of all aspects of medicolegal death investigation
- Not available to Registry Associates, without first obtaining the Registry Diplomate certification.



BOARDCERTIFICATION



Current Diplomate, in good standing for at least six months



Associates Degree or higher



Currently employed by a Medical Examiner/Coroner office with the job responsibility to independently conduct medicolegal death scene investigations, or supervise such investigations



At least 4,000 hours of experience

BOARDCERTIFICATION



Employment Verification Form



Reaffirm the Code of Ethics and Conduct



References from:

- Forensic Science Specialist
- Law Enforcement
- Administrator/Supervisor



2 part examination, up to 5.5 hours

- 240 multiple choice questions
- Performance section 3 medicolegal death scene scenarios

RECERTIFICATION



Must recertify every five years



Be in good standing



Demonstrate continued competency

- Employment Verification Form or
- If not currently employed, a one time extension is available through a recertification exam



45 hours of approved continuing education



Reaffirm the Code of Ethics and Conduct

WHY GET CERTIFIED?

- Official recognition by an independent professional certification body that is FSAB accredited
- Certifies that an individual has acquired the specialized knowledge and demonstrated proficiency in the standards of practice
- Employers know that ABMDI certificants are held to the highest quality of professional and personal conduct through the ABMDI Code of Ethics and Conduct



ABMDIIMPACT

- Continuing Education required for employment
- Several state laws passed requiring ABMDI certification
- NAME and IACME include ABMDI certification in their accreditation standards
- Many jurisdictions require ABMDI certification as a condition of employment, or for career advancement and pay increase incentives
