


The South Bronx is a neighborhood impacted by decades of environmental injustice.





Dear Commissioner Dominguez

We write to highlight the imminent public health and environmental risks associated with the upcoming lease sale of the Harlem River Yards Trade Center. Harlem River Yards is a waterfront industrial property in the Mott Haven and Port Morris neighborhoods of the Bronx that is likely to be leased to last-mile delivery warehousine.

Harlem River Yards has operated under the ownership of the New York State Department of Transportation (ONYSDOT) since 1990, Currently, be State of New York is in a 99-year less as experient with Harlem River Yards as a mixed-use size. Since the late 1990, River Yard bas an incident size of the 1990, and operate Harlem River Yards has undergone substantial commercial development after the State accepted several proposals for its privatization. In has since housed a New York Post printing plant, a waste treatment plant, and a FeEIK distribution context.

As the e-commerce market grows in popularity, last-mile distribution has become more reliant on urban warehousing to expedit delivery to consumers while miliaging rapidly increasing nepoly chain costs.¹ The growing demand for urban warehousing signited a debate in 2015 over the proposed relocation of a Freshibitree warehouse location to the Harlem River Varal Trade Center, which developers brought to fruition despite vehement opposition from Brown residents over the use of the space. Developers tout the Harlem River Var Trade Center as accessible to the most density populated communer base in the country.

The potential economic benefits and job growth that the site would bring to the Browx do not outweigh the central nervitorement risks and threats to spublic health that would accompay it.
