Social Determinants of Health


"The social determinants of health are the conditions in which people are born, grow, work, live and age, and the wider forces that shape the conditions of daily life."

Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Health System – Example of Care Model that Addresses SDOH

- One of the largest integrated health systems and learning health systems in the U.S.
 - > 9 million enrollees > 1,000 sites of care
- High prevalence of mental health conditions and substance use disorders among VA users
- Health care and social missions
 - Eliminates insurance as a contributor to disparities

Mental Health Condition Prevalence by Veteran Status and VA use*




 Some conditions, e.g., suicide risk, and risk factors, e.g., homelessness, much higher in Veterans**

Mental Health Condition Prevalence by Veteran Status and VA use*




SUD Prevalence in VA users: 13%**







Health Factors are Modifiable

Example: Patients with a SUD diagnosis reported worse experiences for 8 of 12 patient experience measures, including access, provider communication, and information received




Inter-related Health Factors

Race, Poverty, and Mental Health Drive VA Colorectal Cancer Screening Disparities

May FP, ..., Washington DL. Med Care. 2019 Oct;57(10):773-80.

- Findings: overall colorectal cancer screening rate 81.5%
 - Lowest rates: American Indian/Alaska Native Veterans, individuals in lowest socio-economic status quintile, individuals with serious mental illness and those with SUD
 - Small advantage: Black, Hispanic, and Asian Veterans, older age groups



Social Needs Screening and Interventions

- Screening for social needs in VA primary
 care settings (e.g., food insecurity)
 - Quality Improvement initiative for more comprehensive screening and embedded linkages with resources: Assessing Circumstances and Offering Resources for Needs (ACORN)*


ACORN implementation, evaluation, and expansion supported by VHA Office of Health Equity.

Social Needs Screening and Interventions (continued)

- Tailor clinical setting for specific populations
 - H-PACT (Patient Aligned Care Teams) =
 Patient-centered medical home care delivery models for homeless-experienced Veterans
 - MH clinics with primary care and other services
- Direct delivery of social services
 - Housing for homeless-experienced Veterans
