

Joia A. Crear-Perry, MD, FACOG, is the founder & Director of the National Birth Equity Collaborative. Dr. Crear-Perry identifies & challenges racism as a root cause of health inequities. She is a highly sought-after trainer & speaker who has been featured in national & international publications, including *Essence* & *Ms.* magazine. In 2020, Dr. Crear-Perry was honored by *USA Today* in its “Women of the Century” series & featured on *ABC Nightline*’s “Hear Her Voice.” Dr. Crear-Perry has twice addressed the United Nations Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights to elevate the cause of gender diversity & urge a human rights framework toward addressing maternal mortality. Previously, she served as the executive director of the Birthing Project, director of women’s & children’s services at Jefferson Community Healthcare Center, & as the director of clinical services for the City of New Orleans Health Department. Dr. Crear-Perry currently serves as a principal at Health Equity Cypher & on the Board of Trustees for Black Mamas Matter Alliance, Community Catalyst, National Clinical Training Center for Family Planning, & the University of California, San Francisco Preterm Birth Initiative. She is an adjunct professor at Tulane School of Public Health. After completing undergraduate studies at Princeton University & Xavier University, Dr. Crear-Perry received her MD from Louisiana State University & completed her residency in obstetrics & gynecology at Tulane University’s School of Medicine. She is married to Dr. Andre Perry & has three children (Jade, Carlos, & Robeson) & one grandson (Quinn). Her love is her family; health equity is her passion; maternal & child health are her callings.

Cara C. Heuser, MD, Intermountain Health, is a maternal-fetal medicine physician at Intermountain Health’s IMC Maternal Fetal Specialists OB Clinic, where she serves patients throughout the Salt Lake Valley. She provides comprehensive care, including preconception counseling, high-risk ultrasound management, and prenatal diagnosis. Dr. Heuser is dedicated to supporting pregnancies complicated by maternal health issues and fetal conditions. Her research interests focus on stillbirth epidemiology, pre-eclampsia, and perinatal decision-making. She has been recognized with numerous awards for her substantial contribution to excellence in health equity scholarship, women's health and mentorship, including the Presidential Award in Excellence in Science Mathematics and Engineering Mentorship and a Presidential Leadership Scholar. She is a member of The National Academy of Medicine, a former member of the US Preventive Services Task Force and serves on the NIH Office of Research in Women's Health Advisory Committee. She is also a member of the National Academy of Medicine's Roundtable on the Promotion of Health Equity. She completed her bachelor's degree at the University of Chicago, her medical degree at Rush Medical College, her residency at Yale University, and her fellowship in family planning at Northwestern University.

Winston Wong, MD, MS, is a Scholar-in-Residence at the Kaiser Permanente UCLA for Health Equity with a four-decade history of addressing health equity as a clinician, medical director, officer of the U.S. Public Health Service, physician executive, non-profit Board director, federal advisor, and philanthropic leader. He currently leads the National Council of Asian Pacific Islander Physicians after a 17-year career as Medical Director, Community Benefit for Kaiser Permanente. Anchored by his experiences as an FQHC physician serving residents in Oakland Chinatown, Dr. Wong has led national efforts to advance cultural competence and access to marginalized populations, including chair of the DHHS Advisory Committee on Minority Health.
