Group Quarters Operation Definitions

- A Group Quarters (GQ) is a place where people live or stay in a group living arrangement that is owned or managed by an entity
 or organization providing housing and/or services for the residents. This is not a typical household-type living arrangement.
 These services may include custodial or medical care as well as other types of assistance, and residency is commonly restricted
 to those receiving these services
- People living in group quarters are usually not related to each other
- Group quarters include such places as college/university student housing, residential treatment centers, nursing/skilled nursing facilities, group homes, correctional facilities, and workers' group living quarters and job corps centers
- As part of the Group Quarters operation, the Census Bureau developed special enumeration procedures to provide
 opportunities for people experiencing homelessness to be counted at service locations and pre-identified outdoor locations.
 These are soup kitchens, regularity scheduled mobile food vans, and targeted non-sheltered outdoor locations
- There are close to 30 group quarter type codes and definitions
- Group Quarter residents represents 3.2 percent of the population small population, but large impact



Group Quarter Operation Definitions

Complexities

- There is a different enumeration strategy for every group quarters type
- There is a 'Gatekeeper' for all group quarters facilities and the Gatekeeper helps decide the group quarters type, access to residents, and how residents will be counted The Gatekeeper's (AKA the group quarter administrator) main concern is the safety and confidentiality of the residents
- Assistant living facilities are housing units, but if there is a floor or wing where residents receive 7 day/24-hour care (skilled nursing) those units are considered group quarters. This means some of the residents receive an invitation to respond via the internet or mail, and the Gatekeeper or administrator decides how the group quarters residents will participate in the Census
- Some student housing facilities are considered housing units, and some are considered group quarters
- If a hotel is considered a person's usual home elsewhere, it is considered a housing unit, but if the hotel is housing people based because of a natural disaster, it is considered a group quarters. If all units of the hotel is housing individuals experiencing homelessness it is considered a group quarters. If a hotel is housing both individuals experiencing homelessness and individuals who are paying for extended care, it is considered a housing unit



Group Quarters Operation Definitions

Strategies

- Data collection strategies allow group quarters administrators several options that can be used to count residents that meet their concerns
- There are various paper data collection methods and an electronic data collection method
- The data collection strategies were also designed to be agile because group quarters administrators sometimes change enumeration methods during the time of enumeration
- Because of the agility built into group quarters data collection, during the 2020 Group Quarters Data Collection we were able to switch from in-person enumeration methods to other methods during the Pandemic

2020 Residence Rules

The three key principles of the Residence Criteria for 2020 were essentially unchanged

- Count people at their usual residence, which is the place where they live and sleep most of the time.
- People in certain types of group facilities on Census Day are counted at the group facility.
- People who do not have a usual residence, or who cannot determine a usual residence, are counted where they are on Census Day.

- Maritime/Military Vessel Enumeration
- Deployed Military Enumeration



2020 Census Group Quarters Operations

Advance Contact (In-Office and In-Field) operation: February 3, 2020 – March 6, 2020

Area Census Office (ACO) clerks made a telephone call to the GQ (Student Housing Administrators) to confirm and explain the procedures for the upcoming Group Quarters Enumeration (GQE) operation. The Census worker:

- Verified the Group Quarter name, address information, contact name, phone number, and business email address.
- Collected an expected Census Day population count and maximum population count.
- Allowed facility managers to choose a method of enumeration based on the GQ type.
- Scheduled an appointment for enumeration.
- **Note:** If there was no available contact name or a phone number, the designated staff made a personal visit to collect the above information and discuss the enumeration procedures including the enumeration options.

2020 Census Group Quarters Operations After Start of COVID - 19

Group Quarters Enumeration Operation (In-Office and In-Field) Operation: April 1, 2020 – August 26, 2020

- The primary objective of the 2020 Census Group Quarters Enumeration operation was to enumerate people residing in a Group Quarters as of April 1, Census Day using their preferred choice of enumeration.
 - In-Office: GQ Enumeration: April 1, 2020 August 26, 2020
 - Electronic Response Data Transfer (eResponse)
 - In-Field: GQ Enumeration:
 - Alternative Paper Response Data Collection (Administrative response records): Mail Out/Mail Back: April 20, 2020 August 26,

 - In-Person GQ Enumeration: July 1, 2020 August 26, 2020
 - In-person Paper Response Data Collection Pick Up: July 1, 2020 August 26, 2020

2020 Census Service-Based Enumeration After Start of COVID - 19

Service-Based Enumeration Operation: September 22, 2020 – September 25, 2020

The SBE operation was conducted at service-based locations and targeted non-sheltered outdoor locations (TNSOLs) to provide an opportunity for people experiencing homelessness to be included in the census. These service-based locations include:

- Shelters For People Experiencing Homelessness
- Soup Kitchens
- Regularly Scheduled Mobile Food Vans

Planned modes of data collection for SBE were:

- In-Person interview
- Paper listings—Field staff pick up a paper listing from the GQ administrator.
 - Paper listings were keyed at the National Processing Center.

Planned TNSOL Enumeration: Evening of September 23, 2020, through the morning of September 24, 2020

In-Person interview

Operational adjustments:

- Drop Off/Pick Up of ICQs enumeration option was added for Shelters Only
- ACO Clerks began calling SBE locations to reschedule appointments and find TNSOLs: August 17, 2020





2020 Census Service-Based Enumeration Results*

During the 2020 Census Service-Based Enumeration, field workers and GQ contact persons submitted data using the following enumeration methods for their locations:

- <1 percent used the electronic response data transfer (eResponse) methodology, meaning administrators uploaded administrative response data for residents residing in their GQ onto the Census Bureau's secure server
- 3 percent chose the drop-off/pick-up option, which involved census field staff dropping off individual census questionnaires
 (ICQs) for the GQ contact person to distribute to residents living or staying in their GQ, after which census field staff returned to
 pick up the completed ICQs
- 88 percent chose In-Person interviews, meaning census field staff conducted interviews with residents to complete the ICQs
- 9 percent chose Paper Response Data Collection meaning GQ contact person provided census field staff with a paper listing containing response data for their residents

2020 Census Service-Based Enumeration After Start of COVID - 19

Unique Challenges For SBE Posed By The Pandemic And Other External Events

- Fires and Smoke
- Hurricanes and other tropical storms
- Civil unrest across the nation
- Obtain an updated frame for the revised enumeration dates
 - Previously identified service locations that targeted people experiencing homelessness were no longer allowed to operate
 - There was an increase of Hotels/Motels that became quarantine facilities/ being used to house people experiencing homelessness



College/University Student Housing



2020 Census Group Quarters Operations

- About 15% of GQs were college/university student housing
- Because of COVID-19, many students were sent home and not living in student housing at the time of Group Quarters enumeration
- Historically, college/university contact persons mainly select methods that allow students to self-respond
- Due to COVID-19, contact persons had to answer the census on behalf of the students using facility administrative records
- eResponse method mainly used.

2020 Census Group Quarters Advance Contact Operation Results*

During the 2020 Census Group Quarters Advance Contact operation, college/university student housing administrators selected the following enumeration methods for their students:

- 47 percent, chose the electronic response data transfer (eResponse) methodology, meaning administrators will upload directory-level information about each student onto the Census Bureau's secure server
- 35 percent chose the drop-off/pick-up option, which involves census field staff dropping off individual census questionnaires (ICQs) for the administrator to distribute to students, after which census field staff would return to pick up the completed ICQs
- 9 percent chose In-Person interviews, meaning census field staff will conduct interviews with students to complete the ICQs
- 10 percent chose Paper Response Data Collection meaning administrators will provide census field staff with a paper listing containing directory information about their students

2020 Census Group Quarters Operation Updates Due to the Coronavirus - 2019

Given the dismissal of students from on-campus housing due to the health crisis, the Census Bureau started reaching out to group quarter administrators that chose the In-Person and the Drop-off/pick-up methods to ask them to choose either:

- <u>eResponse</u> or the <u>Group Quarters Enumeration</u> Paper Response Data Collection options.
- While the two methods above did not give students and residents in noninstitutional GQ types like military barrack, group homes, etc. the opportunity to self-respond, which was preferred, it allowed the Census Bureau to accurately enumerate students at school despite the fact they may be temporarily living at home or elsewhere.
- Based on feedback from the Department of Education Student Privacy Policy Office webinar on February 14, 2020, the eResponse and Paper Response Data Collection methods have FERPA implications
 - Schools could provide "Directory Information" for each of their students without student consent unless the student has opted out of the disclosure.
 - Schools could not include race/ethnicity and gender as directory information under FERPA.





2020 Census Group Quarters Operation Updates Due to the Coronavirus - 2019

- Census Bureau staff conducted several presentations and webinars with the Department of Education (DoE) and with the American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers (AACRAO) to discuss the eResponse method
- Census Bureau staff also prepared audio messaging on the Census Bureau website directed at students and how data would be collected
- The DoE and AACRAO placed information about data collection for college/university student housing, as well for off campus students on their respective websites
- Because of FERPA, administrators could provide only limited information about students



2020 Group Quarters (GQ) Enumeration

- 88 percent* of college/student housing were enumerated during the regular GQE data collection
- Post data collection, December 2020, the Census Bureau conducted phone calls to student housing facilities, and well as other GQ types to verify counts and attempt to convert refusals
- College/university student housing increased from 88 percent to 97 percent*

Summary

- Overall, because of the design of the GQ operation and established partnership, GQ staff was able to pivot and inform GQ administrators and umbrella organizations of the need to use less in-person methods of data collection to protect and ensure the safety of their residents and census workers
- The success of that outreach is realized in the comparison of enumeration methods from GQAC operation and GQE operation
