The teacher's knowledge of individual children and what's offered by the curriculum




The plans and materials in the curriculum

- Guidance on daily schedule





Cultural Responsiveness

- **Interactions:** Does the curriculum support culturally responsive ways of
- **Learning experiences:** Does the curriculum encourage learning experiences for children that build on their families' traditions, cultures, values, and beliefs?
- Learning materials: Does the curriculum suggest how to use learning materials that authentically represent the cultures and ethnicities of children and families?





Linguistic Responsiveness

Scaffolding strategies: Does the curriculum provide research-based scaffolding strategies to support the development and learning of children who are dual language learners?

Home and/or tribal language: Does the curriculum provide guidance on how to authentically incorporate children's home and/or tribal languages into the learning environment?



- Very few curricula provide guidance on how to implement learning experiences based on children's individual interests.



Majority of curricula provide general guidance on how to scaffold development and learning of children who are dual language learners, or how to incorporate children's home language

• Vast majority of curricula do provide general or specific guidance embedded throughout the curriculum on how to make learning experiences responsive to individual children's strengths

• Very few curricula provide guidance on how to implement culturally responsive practices





Parent and Family Engagement

Vast majority of curricula (15 out of 17) provide strategies for how to communicate with families, and many provide materials to distribute to families, some in English and another language.

The curricula lack information on how to communicate with families in culturally or linguistically responsive ways, how to engage parents from diverse cultures, or parents who do not speak English.

How to learn from parents and families (not just share information with them).










Beyond Curricular Supports, **Early Childhood Educators Need:**

- Curriculum training
- Ongoing feedback on implementation through coaching and mentoring
- Professional development focusing on specific topics to support effective implementation and how to adapt the curriculum.
 - Observing and noticing children's learning
 - Cultural and linguistic responsiveness
 - Family engagement
 - Individualization based on children's strengths and needs
