KFF: Who We Are + LGBT Data Collection

 KFF (Kaiser Family Foundation) is a nonpartisan nonprofit organization focusing on national health issues and the U.S. role in global health policy. We conduct policy analysis, including polling, journalism, and communications programs.

LGBT Data Collection

- KFF collects LGBT identity in all of our polling
- Relatively small sample = limited ability to provide demographic breaks among LGBT people
 - 2 months of data when reporting on this population
- Multi-step questions and disaggregation of sexual orientation and gender identity not used due to sample size limitations



Data Overview

KFF COVID-19 Vaccine Monitor

- A project from our polling team Launched in December 2020 to track public opinion and experiences with the COVID-19 pandemic and vaccines.
- Nationally representative monthly surveys of US adults.
- Probability-based sampling, random digit dial (cell phone & landline), live interviews in English and Spanish, oversamples of Black and Hispanic adults
- Data in this presentation drawn from:
 - Nov. 30 Dec. 8, 2020 and Jan. 11- 18, 2021
 - April 15-29, 2021 and May 18-25, 2021



LGBT People Report that COVID-19 Has Negatively Impacted Their Mental Health at Greater Rates & More Severely Than Non-LGBT

Do you feel that worry or stress related to coronavirus has had a negative impact on your mental health, or not?





LGBT Households Faced COVID-era Job Loss at Higher Rates Than Non-LGBT Households

Since February [2020], have you or another adult in your household lost a job, been placed on furlough, or had your income or hours reduced because of the coronavirus outbreak, or not?



Both/Don't know






Unvaccinated LGBT Adults Are More Likely to be Uninsured, Lower Income, and have Lower Levels of Education Than Their Vaccinated Counterparts

- Among unvaccinated LGBT adults:
 - Two-thirds (65%) earn less than \$40,000 annually
 - Compared to 44% of vaccinated LGBT adults
 - 85% do not have a college degree
 - Compared to 60% of vaccinated LGBT adults
 - One-quarter (25%) do not have health insurance
 - Compared to 17% of vaccinated LGBT adults

Demographics associated with lower vaccination rates overall



Concerns and Misconceptions About Vaccine Safety, Side Effects, and Cost Are Top of Mind

 Top reason why unvaccinated LGBT adults say they have not tried to get a COVID-19 vaccine appointment: concerns about vaccine safety & side effects.

- Half of all unvaccinated adults (incl. LGBT adults) say they are concerned they might need to miss work if the side effects of the vaccine make them sick.
- One-third of all unvaccinated adults (incl. LGBT adults) say they are concerned they would have to pay out of pocket for a COVID-19 vaccine.



In their own words....

What is the biggest concern you have about getting a COVID-19 vaccine?

- "Honestly, I just think that the vaccine was "rushed", but I'll probably consider it later on [in] the future..." Female, Black, bisexual, Florida
- "Know what really it contains? Is it trustworthy?" Female, Hispanic, transgender, Florida
- The side effects; mainly, contracting COVID-19 from the vaccine. –
 Male, Black, bisexual, California
- Long lasting side effects, no long term benefits. Male, gay, White,
 Washington



In their own words....

What is the main reason you have not tried to get a COVID-19 vaccine appointment?

- "Just waiting to hear about any adverse reactions. Do plan on going in the next month or so." Other, White, Minnesota
- "Because I'm scared of the effects." Female, Black, Washington DC
- "Want to see how it effects other people, and other people might need it bad. I work from home." Male, White, North Carolina
- "Only knew a few people who've gotten it. Waiting for more [people] to safely get it." Female, Black, New Jersey
