Challenges related to getting on waitlist


- Language & culturally responsive care
 - Availability of language interpreters
 - Misinformation & delay in waitlisting



Challenges related to getting on waitlist

• Distrust


- Discrimination
- Reluctance to seek medical care



Steps to reduce inequities

Policy level intervention

 Clinic/ health systems level intervention: Patient-centered conversations that are language concordant & culturally responsive



Waitlisting Undocumented Immigrants

Argument against

Scarce organs

Counterargument

 Undocumented immigrants disproportionately contribute to the pool of donated organs California



Higher rates of living donors

Waitlisting Undocumented Immigrants

Argument against

• Immigrants may lose graft

Counterargument

- Unethical to use non-medical factors as proxy for likelihood of success
- No difference in graft survival between undocumented immigrants and US citizens

Waitlisting Undocumented Immigrants

Argument against

Immigrants are a financial drain

Counterargument


 Undocumented immigrants more likely to rejoin workforce & contribute to the Medicare Trust Fund.

 Cost-savings, especially when alternative is emergency care

Future Research

- Proportion of undocumented who are not referred no literature
- Amount of time from referral to waitlist no literature
- Transplant outcomes between undocumented & documented
 Medicaid patients no literature on heart and lung
- Severity of illness at time of transplantation no literature on heart, lung
- Cost-effectiveness study comparing emergency care to transplantation – no literature on liver, heart, lung
- Assess patient level education regarding benefits of transplantation

Percent of adult Medicaid patients who received kidney transplants from 1990-2011 who were undocumented by state



Ca (244), NY (26), and MA (18) performed transplantation on the most undocumented immigrants
