

Social Determinants of Health and Suicide/Other Health Outcomes among American Indian/Alaska Native Populations

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Snapshot: American Indians and Alaska Natives¹

- As of 2019: estimated 5.7 million people classified as American Indian and Alaska Native (Al/AN) alone or in combination comprising 1.7 percent of the total U.S. population.
 - Seventy-eight (78) percent live outside tribal areas
 - Twenty-two (22) percent live on reservations/trust lands
 - Sixty (60) percent live in metropolitan areas
- States with the largest populations include: Arizona,
 California, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Texas, North Carolina,
 Alaska, Washington, South Dakota and New York.
- Currently, there are 574 federally recognized Tribes and more than 100 state recognized Tribes.

American Indian/Alaska Native Population and Veteran Status²

- U.S. Veteran Population: 18 Million
- U.S. Federally Recognized Tribes: 574
- U.S. Al/AN Veteran Population: 150,000
- AI/AN Veterans were 88.3% men and 11.7% women.
- Al/AN Veterans are more likely to live in the West region of the United States than Veterans of other races.
- Al/AN Veterans median age was 59 while the median age for Veterans of other races was 64.
- AI/AN Veterans had a lower personal income than Veterans of other races.
- Al/AN Veterans were likely to lack health insurance than Veterans of other races.
- Al/AN Veterans were more likely to have a Service Connected Disability than Veterans of other races.

American Indian/Alaska Native Population and Disparities¹

- Al/AN people have a lower life expectancy that is 78.4 years whereas for non-Hispanic White the projected life expectancy is 80.6 years.
- Issues impacting life expectancy:
 - Disproportionate disease burden
 - Inadequate education
 - Disproportionate poverty
 - Discrimination
 - Racism
 - Cultural differences
 - Economic adversity
 - Poor social conditions

American Indian/Alaska Native Population and Suicide⁴

- In 2017, suicide was the 8th leading cause of death for all Al/AN across all ages.
- 3,447 deaths in the Al/AN population
 - 18% (640) deaths by suicide
 - 46.6% by Suffocation
 - 38.6% by Firearm
- Most stigmatized mental health related problems reported by Al/AN communities:
 - HIV/AIDS
 - Suicide
 - Mental Illness
 - Sexual Assault
- Al/AN people die by suicide at higher rates than other races or ethnic groups, especially for youth.

American Indian/Alaska Native Veterans and Suicide^{5,6}

- Age-adjusted suicide rates among Al/AN
 Veterans in cohort over 15 year period (2014 2018) more than doubled (19.1 47.0/100,000)
 with the youngest age group (18-39) exhibiting
 the highest suicide rate.
- Suicide is an increasing problem among Al/AN VHA Veterans.
- Younger Al/AN Veterans are at particularly high risk and warrant focused prevention efforts.
- Al/AN Veterans have more than twice the risk of suicide ideation relative to Non-Hispanic White Veterans.
