## Panelist bios

**Maria Echaveste** is the President of the Opportunity Institute, a non-profit focused on increasing social and economic mobility and advancing racial equity. Before that, she built a distinguished career working as a consultant, lecturer, senior White House official, long-time community leader, and corporate attorney. Echaveste also has been a Senior Fellow at UC Berkeley's Center for Latin American Studies since 2008.

Echaveste served in various capacities in President Clinton's administration, including Assistant to the President and Deputy White House Chief of Staff (1998-2001); Director of the White House Office of Public Liaison (1997-1998) and Wage and Hour Administrator of the U.S. Department of Labor (1993-1997).

Echaveste serves on the board of directors of UCSF-Benioff Oakland Children's Hospital; Cadiz, Inc. (a publicly-held natural resources company); Mi Familia Vota, and SMASH (formerly known as the Level Playing Field Institute), focused on improving STEM education for students of color.

Echaveste received a B.A. from Stanford University and J.D. from U.C. Berkeley School of Law.

Michael Jones-Correa is the President's Distinguished Professor of Political Science and Director of the Center for the Study of Race, Ethnicity and Immigration (CSERI) at the University of Pennsylvania. He has worked and published extensively on immigrant political mobilization, inter-group relations, and the role of institutional actors in integrating immigrants into receiving societies. He is a co-principal investigator of the 2006 Latino National Survey, and the 2012 and 2016 Latino Immigrant National Election Study (LINES). Recent publications include Holding Fast: Resilience and Civic Engagement among Latino Immigrants (Russell Sage 2020), Outsiders No More? Models of Immigrant Political Incorporation (Oxford 2013), Latinos in the New Millennium (Cambridge, 2012) and Latino Lives in America: Making It Home (Temple, 2010).

**Doug Massey** is Henry G. Bryant Professor of Sociology and Public Affairs, with a joint appointment in The Princeton School of Public and International Affairs. A member of the National Academy of Sciences, the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and the American Philosophical Society, he is Past-President of the American Academy of Political and Social Science, the American Sociological Association, and the Population Association of America. Massey's research focuses on international migration, race and housing, discrimination, education, urban poverty, stratification, and Latin America, especially Mexico. He recently edited a special issue of Daedalus, published by the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, entitled Immigration, Nativism, and Race in the United States.

**Ali Noorani** is the Executive Director of the National Immigration Forum, a non-partisan advocacy organization working with faith, law enforcement and business leaders to promote the value of immigrants and immigration. Growing up in California as the son of Pakistani immigrants, Ali quickly learned how to forge alliances among people of wideranging backgrounds, a skill that has served him extraordinarily well as one of the nation's most innovative coalition builders.

Ali provides a principled and reasoned voice on immigration policy and politics, and has appeared on Fox News, CNN, MSNBC, NBC News, ABC News, PBS NewsHour and various radio and local news programs. He has been quoted on the pages of most of the nation's major dailies and is a regular speaker at conferences and campuses across the country.

Ali is an Emerson Dial Fellow, a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, holds a Master's in Public Health from Boston University and is a graduate of the University of California, Berkeley. Ali lives in Washington, D.C. and is the author of "There Goes the Neighborhood: How Communities Overcome Prejudice and Meet the Challenge of American Immigration," (Prometheus, April 2017) and host of "Only in America" podcast.

**Rebecca Shi** is the executive director of the American Business Immigration Coalition's (ABIC), a bipartisan coalition of 1200 CEOs, employers, University Presidents and advocates across 13 states including FL, TX, AZ, UT, NV, CO, MA, ME, NH, IL, WI, North and South Carolina. ABIC's mission is federal immigration reform to bring our immigration system to the 21st century, grow the economy, create jobs and provide a path to citizenship for 11 million undocumented workers. Rebecca was named a "20 in their 20s" by Crains' Business Chicago, a "Governor Jim Edgar Fellow", and Asian American community leadership honoree. Rebecca's work and commentary have been featured in WSJ, NY Times, Washington Post, Politico, and CNBNC.

**Mary C. Waters** is the John Loeb Professor of Sociology, the PVK Professor of Arts and Sciences, and the interim director of the Population Center at Harvard University. A sociologist and demographer, her work has focused on the integration of immigrants and their children, the social determinants of health, immigration policy, disasters and their aftermath, and the measurement and meaning of racial and ethnic identity. She is an elected member of the National Academy of Sciences, a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and the American Philosophical Society. Waters chaired the National Academy of Sciences Panel on *The Integration of Immigrants into American Society* (2015).

**Madeline Zavodny** is a Professor of Economics at the Coggin College of Business at the University of North Florida. She is also a Research Fellow at the Institute of Labor Economics (IZA), a Fellow at the Global Labor Organization, and an Adjunct Scholar at the American Enterprise Institute. Much of her research focuses on economic issues related to immigration, including *Beside the Golden Door: U.S. Immigration Reform in a New Era of Globalization* (AEI Press, 2010) and the textbook *The Economics of* 

Immigration (Routledge, 2021). Her research on immigration has also been published in the Journal of Labor Economics, Industrial and Labor Relations Review, the Journal of Policy Analysis and Management and Demography, among others. Before joining UNF she was a professor of economics at Agnes Scott College and Occidental College and an economist with the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta and the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas.
