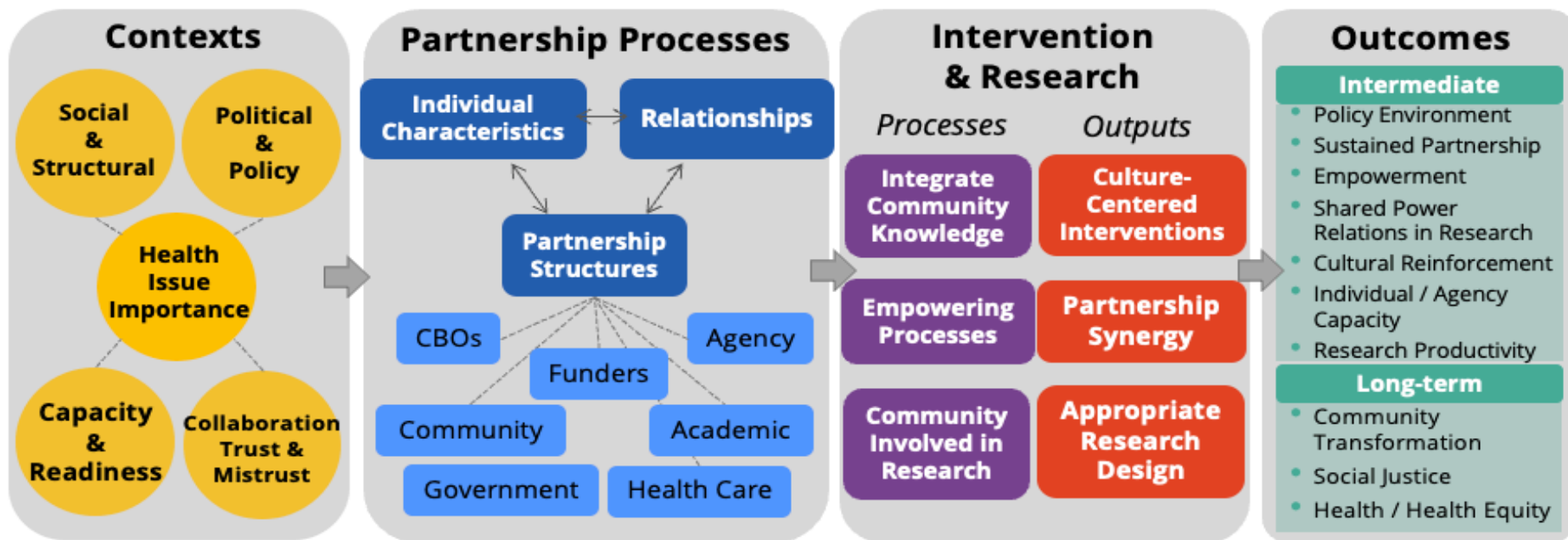


CBPR Conceptual Model

Engage for Equity Promising Practices

(200 research partnerships, 2009)

Associated with Composite Outcome ($p < .05$)

Partnership Capacity: Project has skills and capacity to work effectively together

Shared CBPR Principles and Values: Partnership built on strengths of partners

Community Engaged in Research Action (CERA): (community engaged in all stages)

Influence: Partners believe they have impact on the partnership

Leadership: Perception of PI skills

Resource Management: Appropriate use of financial & in-kind resources

Written Agreement: Formal agreements helpful

Control of Resources: Shared control and 'mostly community' best

Bridging Differences: Capacity of academics to connect to community

Commitment to Collective Empowerment (CCE): Influence/Community Voice;
Collective Reflection; Community Fit; CBPR Principles

Engage for Equity Pathways
