
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
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(1) Care recipients often face multimorbidity



... yet research funding is siloed by conditions.

- Lack of collaboration
- More emphasis on development of new interventions, new models
- Multiple reviews and reports suggest the need for a focus on adaptation, implementation, and sustainment of caregiving interventions



- Funders should consider transdisciplinary and trans-institutional funding opportunities.
- Foundations and societies should build deliberate bridges across these divides to share methods and practices
- Need for common data elements across care recipient illness context, suggesting opportunity for gerontology, palliative care, nursing, and condition specific areas to collaborate

(2) Historically marginalized populations often left out of caregiving research.

- Barriers and burdens of research on caregivers and their recipients not trivial
- Research representation matters.
- Northouse 2010, meta-analysis of cancer caregiving interventions, n=29, found that 84% of caregivers represented were white.
- Ferrell & Wittenberg, 2017 systematic review of cancer caregiving interventions, n=50, that 86% of caregivers represented were white.





... and caregiving context under-recognized

Figure 1. Heterogeneity of caregiving.

Caregiving Context

Living situation/proximity, setting, financial resources, community resources and characteristics

Caregiving Characteristics

Length of caregiving, carer experience and skills, carer communication and advocacy skills, motivation, relationship quality, strength of network, other family obligations

Person receiving Care

Relationship, disease/condition, functional/cognitive status, abilities and strengths, health care needs

Carer

Age, gender, sexual orientation, cultural background, race/ethnicity, employment, religious affiliation, socio-economic status, physical and mental health

Young et al.'s review of 33 systematic reviews of older adult caregiving studies:

- found most interventions were low-to moderate quality
- lack of specificity on social determinants of health







Takeaway #2: Re-build

- Along with bridges, we need new blueprints
- Inclusion criteria is a starting point, not the endpoint –If barriers are about time, logistical needs, or cultural divides, investment in strategies to address those are as critical as the content
- SDOH and social needs of caregivers must be studied and addressed



Example: enCompass Carolina



- enCompass Carolina is a navigator assisted program targeted to rural cancer caregivers and designed to help identify social support needs and connect caregivers to people and resources.
- Adapted for the rural context from a lay navigator-delivered social support mapping intervention called eSNAP (electronic Social Network Assessment Program) designed by Dr. Maija Reblin.






(3) Lack of public and professional awareness about caregiving

- Caregivers feel invisible
- Caregivers are often 'care adjacent' in healthcare delivery
- Caregiving comes as a surprise to too many

Takeaway #3: Beacons

- Communication to caregivers
 - Where, how, and who from to seek resources
- Public service announcements
 - Examples: Portraits of care, #CareCantWait campaign

 AARP Billboards, National Alliance of Caregiving caregivers' spotlights
- Pipeline educational efforts
 - Interprofessional family caregiving competencies
 - Continuing medical and health education
 - Start much, much earlier in the pipeline
- More data, more stories, more reach
