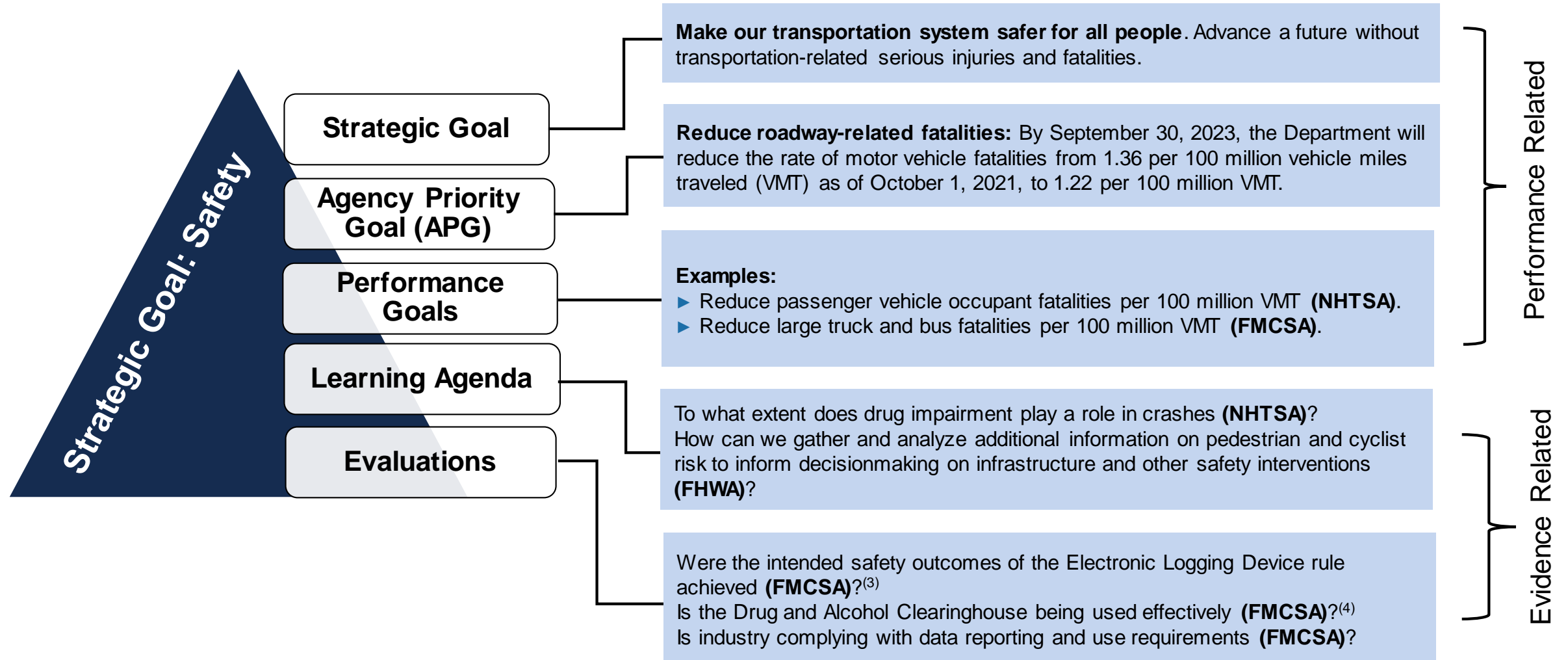

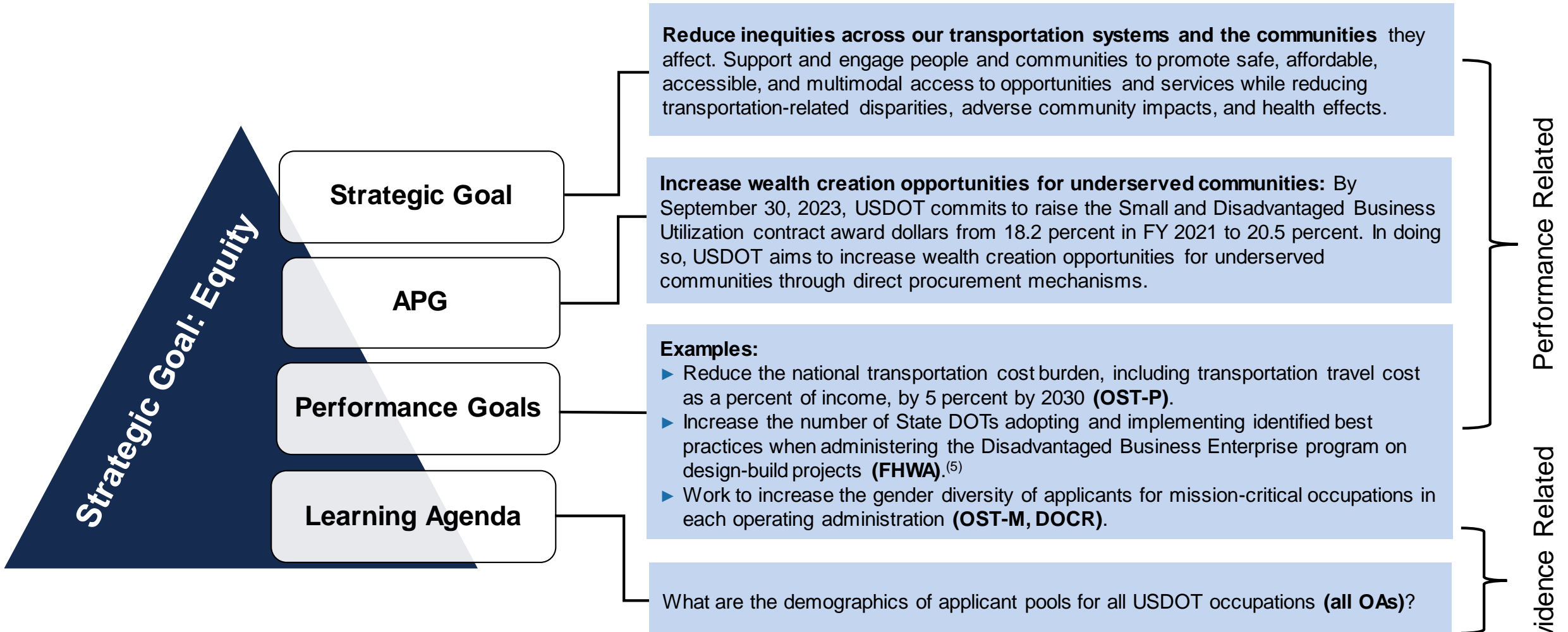

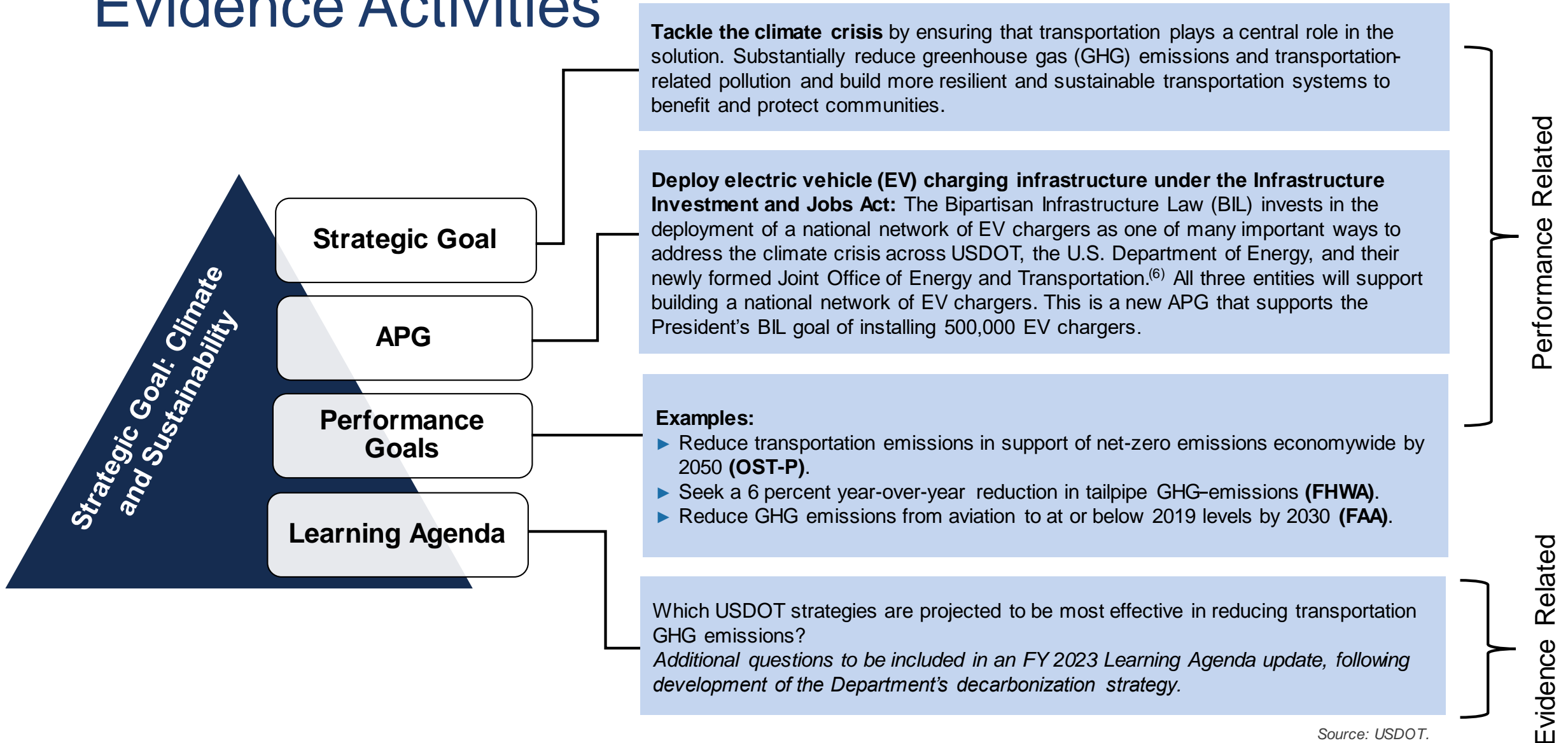
Safety: Performance and Evidence Activities
