




# **Use of Prizes is Evolving**
















Pilot / Adoption



# **Quick History of Prize Management at HHS**

Jan 2011 -COMPETES prize authority signed into law 2011 – Asst. Sec. for Administration and CTO leads implementation

2011 - Delegation of Authority issued

2011- HHS Competition Award Policy created


Sept 2013 - Open Innovation Manager hired

# **General Approach to Prize Development**





## **Highlights from 2011 HHS Award Policy**

- Participant Eligibility. Only US entities (residents and businesses registered in US) can be awarded money from a COMPETES-based competition. Team members may consist of eligible and non-eligible entities.
- Judging. Official 'judges' may consist of one or more persons, and must either be Federal Employees or act as "Special Government Employees." Reviewers may be utilized to provide input to official judges on the submissions.
- Funding. Prizes are NOT grants or contracts. Funding may consist of any appropriated funds, consistent with its use and winners can be paid until funds expire (typically 5 years). Private funding may be used. Funds are obligated when announcement is published.
- **Approval.** StaffDiv heads; OpDiv heads or direct reports must approve COMPETES prize competitions with monetary award \$1m or less. For higher award amounts, Secretarial approval is required.
- Reporting. A post-competition report to the HHS Competes team is required; reports collected and set to White House in preparation for reporting requirements.



# **Prize Management Roles at HHS**

- Challenge Manager. Responsible for the execution of a prize/challenge. Typically a member of the sponsoring program office.
- Award Approving Official. StaffDiv Head, OpDiv Head or Direct Report. Responsible for approving the launch and award of challenges.
- Budget Analyst. Responsible for recording the obligation (once announced) and processing payments upon award.
- Office of the General Counsel. Provides legal advice, if requested. Note OGC approval is not required, but may be useful depending on the situation.
- HHS Open Innovation Manager. Provides guidance and support to Challenge Manager as needed. Also collects reports (as required by COMPETES Act) upon completion.



# **Typical Scenarios for Prize Development**

#### Scenario #1 (Stumbling in the Dark):

- Program tasked with a mission goal looks for new ways to meet them
- Stumbles across prize authority and recognizes one of its unique strengths (partnerships/award outside usual suspects)

#### Scenario #2 (Directed Design):

 Program lead already familiar with prizes builds a prize competition or initiative designed around the authority

#### Scenario #3 (Mandate):

 Program is required to use a prize competition as part of its design

#### Scenario #4 (Experiment):

 Program looks to expand its impact and experiment using a new approach to supplement its core work
