Nick Macchione has over 30 years of clinical and executive experience leading and managing healthcare, public health, behavioral health, housing and human services in governmental settings, hospitals and community non-profits in the New York metropolitan area and San Diego County. Since 1997, Mr. Macchione has worked for the County of San Diego's Health & Human Services Agency with the first ten years as the Deputy Director for the North Coastal, North Inland and North Central regions of the County. Since 2008, he has been serving as the Agency's Director for the entire county region that serves 1.1 million customers with health and human services through a workforce of 6,700 employees, 350 contracted organizations, 168 citizen advisory boards and a \$2.6 billion annual budget. In his role, Macchione is leading a nationally acclaimed, paradigm shift transforming how the County of San Diego government along with nearly 500 non-profits and for-profit partners, such as, the North San Diego Business Chamber, are helping employees, families and entire communities live well. As the chief architect and strategist of "Live Well San Diego," Macchione is championing this large-scale, social movement focused on improving life expectancy and social well-being throughout the county region, and inspiring collective efforts of prevention for all San Diegans to be healthy, safe and thriving.

Macchione holds master's degrees from Columbia University and NYU specializing in leadership, management and policy and is the Malcolm Baldrige Foundation's 2018 Harry S. Hertz Leadership Award Recipient. Nick is a Fellow of the American College of Healthcare Executives, a Public Health Leadership Scholar with the Public Health Institute/federal CDC and a Creating Healthier Communities Fellow of the American Hospital Association.

Currently, Nick is the main architect and director of the County's COVID-19 T3 Strategy of Test, Trace and Treat, a large-scale population health-based strategy using collaborative effort to achieve collective impact in protecting the public's health against COVID-19.

Dr. Wilma J. Wooten, MD, MPH, is the public health officer for the County of San Diego. She received both professional degrees from the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, followed by the completion of residency training at the Georgetown/Providence Hospital Family Practice Residency Program in Washington, DC. In 1989, she completed the joint San Diego State University (SDSU), Graduate School of Public Health (GSPH)/University of California San Diego (UCSD) Preventive Medicine Residency, with an emphasis in Sports Medicine. Dr. Wooten practiced medicine as a faculty member in the UCSD Department of Family and Preventive Medicine from 1990 to 2001. She remains a UCSD volunteer Associate Clinical Professor and is an Adjunct Professor at SDSU/GSPH. She has been with the County of San Diego Health and Human Services Agency since 2001, initially as the Deputy Health Officer and now serves as the Public Health Officer since February 2007. She is an ardent supporter of public health and has a strong interest in health disparities and health equity. Dr. Wooten is a past Board member, and past president (2011-13), of the California Conference of Local Health Officers (CCLHO); current Board member, and past President (2013-15) of the Health Officers Association of California (HOAC); and past Board member (2009-2011) of the National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO). Dr. Wooten is a current Board member of the Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB) of Directors (2011-present), member of the NACCHO Big Cities Health Coalition (2014-present), and member of the Advisory Committee to the Director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) (2015-2019).

Carey Riccitelli serves as the Director of Strategy and Innovation for the County of San Diego Health and Human Services Agency. In this role, she leads Agency-wide programs and efforts including Live Well San Diego, strategy, legislative analysis, and communications. Ms. Riccitelli has worked for the County since 1994, with expertise in strength-based management/team building, cross-sector collaboration/collective impact and achieving challenging and complex goal-driven outcomes that support a healthy, safe and thriving region. She is a graduate of San Diego State University, holding a master's degree in Public Health, with an emphasis in community health.
