



BARRIERS TO MOBILITY



IMPROVING DIAGNOSTIC QUALITY FOR MOBILITY

- Universal mobility assessment
 - Timed Up and Go
 - Gait Speed



BARRIERS TO HOSPITAL MOBILITY CULTURE CHANGE

- Ownership of mobility unclear
- Hospital culture encourages low mobility
- Hospital environment encourages low mobility
- Healthcare policy encourages low mobility

UNINTENDED CONSEQUENCES

- \bullet 1/3 of older adults leave hospital with functional decline¹
- Low mobility linked to:
 - Functional decline²
 - Need for new nursing home placement²
 - Longer length of hospital stay³
 - Falls
