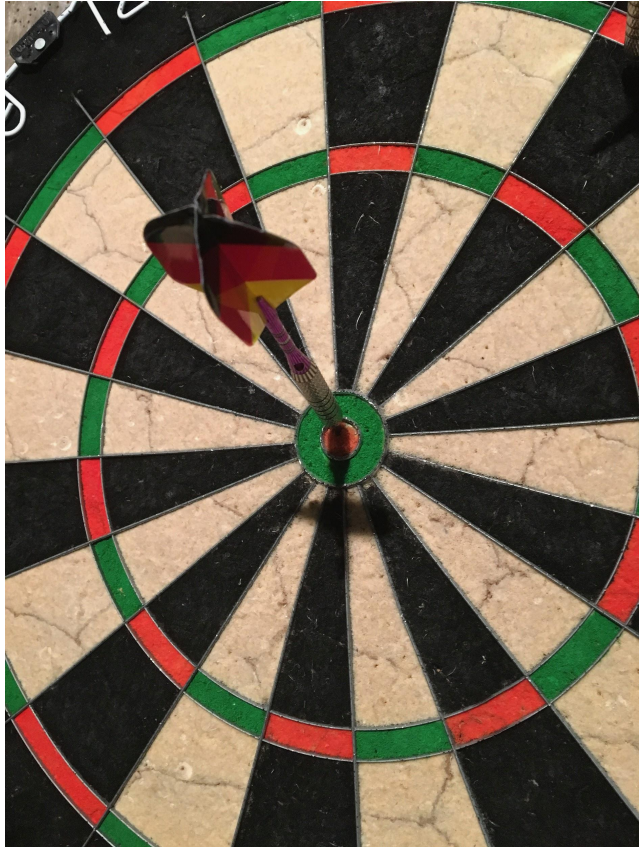

Know what we're aiming for:

Values: Commitments that motivate individual and collective behavior; values are great indicators of what a culture stands for.

Aspirations: Lofty ambitions that are linked to values, and which are unlikely to be met within a decade

Goals: Measurable, actionable aims *-rooted in values-* to change structures of the profession.

Recommendations: Concrete actions that we advise be taken in service of meeting goals, to keep us pointed toward collective values and aspirations.
