


WHAT'S WRONG WITH U.S. CHILD CARE?

Commonly cited problems

- High quality care is expensive and short in supply
- Parents are not sufficiently informed about several aspects of child care
- Caregivers earn low wages
- High turnover among child care workers







The Effects of COVID-19 on Child Care

- Demand side effects
 - Disproportionally more painful for women
- Supply side effects
 - Challenges in hiring due to low wages
 - Increased stringency in regulations

Build Back Better Agenda

- A sliding scale limit on child care costs for families
- Two years of universal preschool
- Raise wages of child care workers and expand training and professional development opportunities
- Making Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit more generous and refundable
