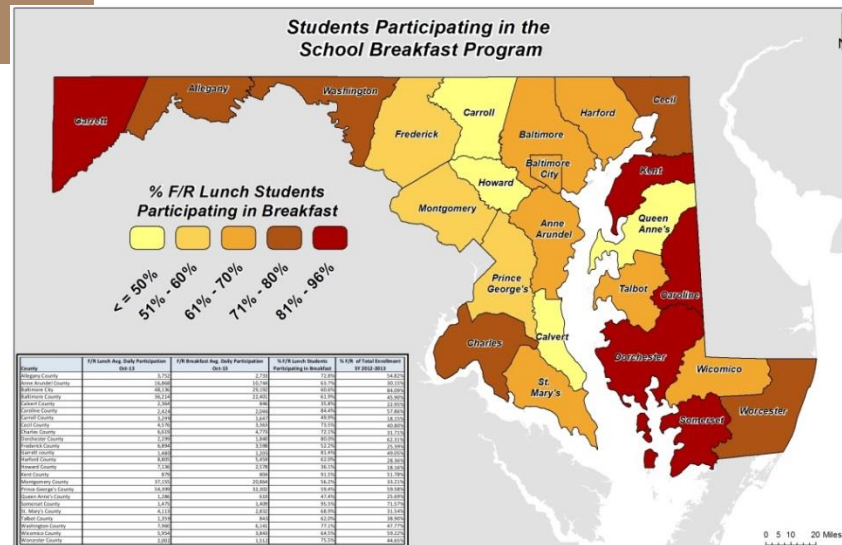
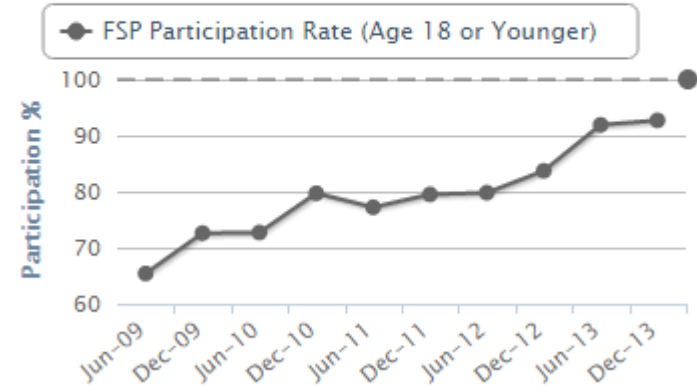

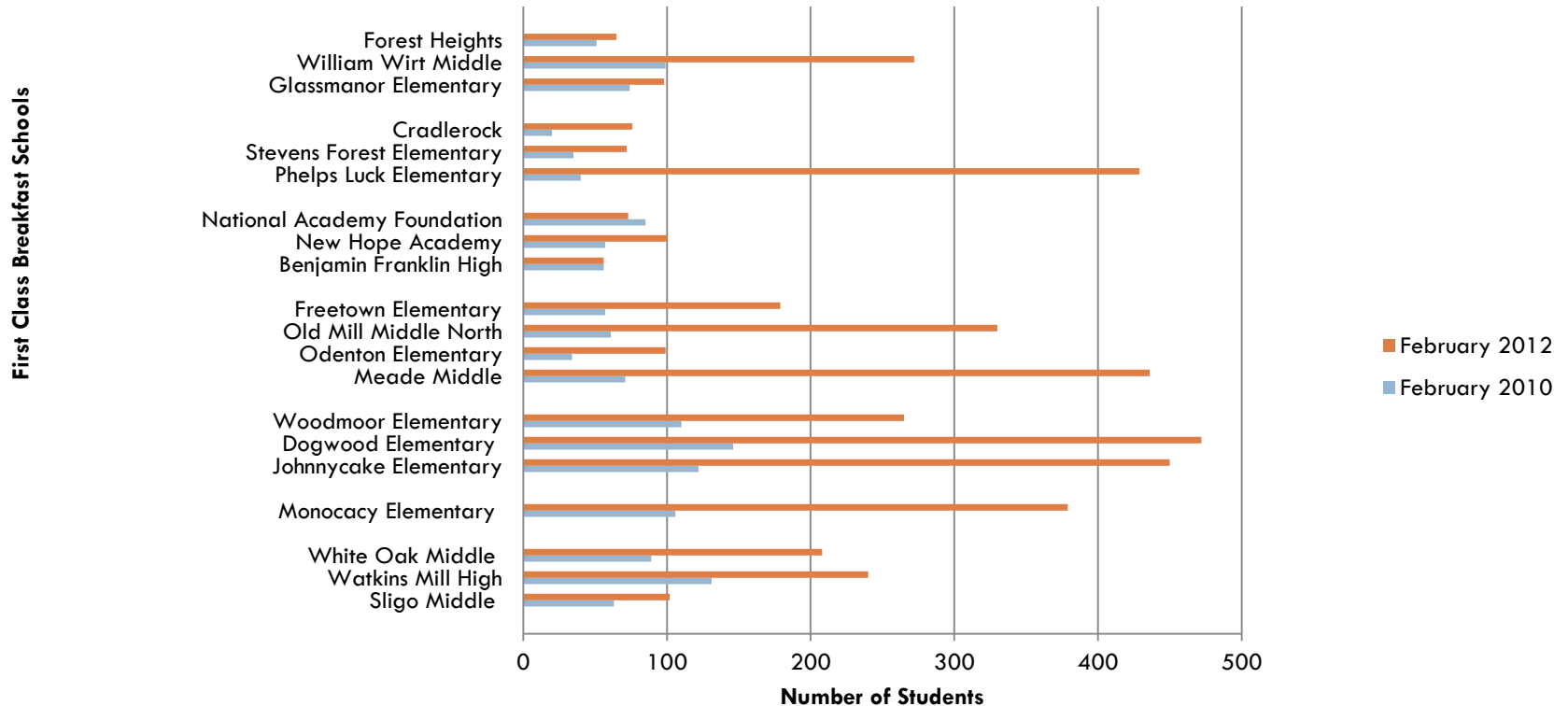

Food Supplement Program (FSP): Penetration Rates



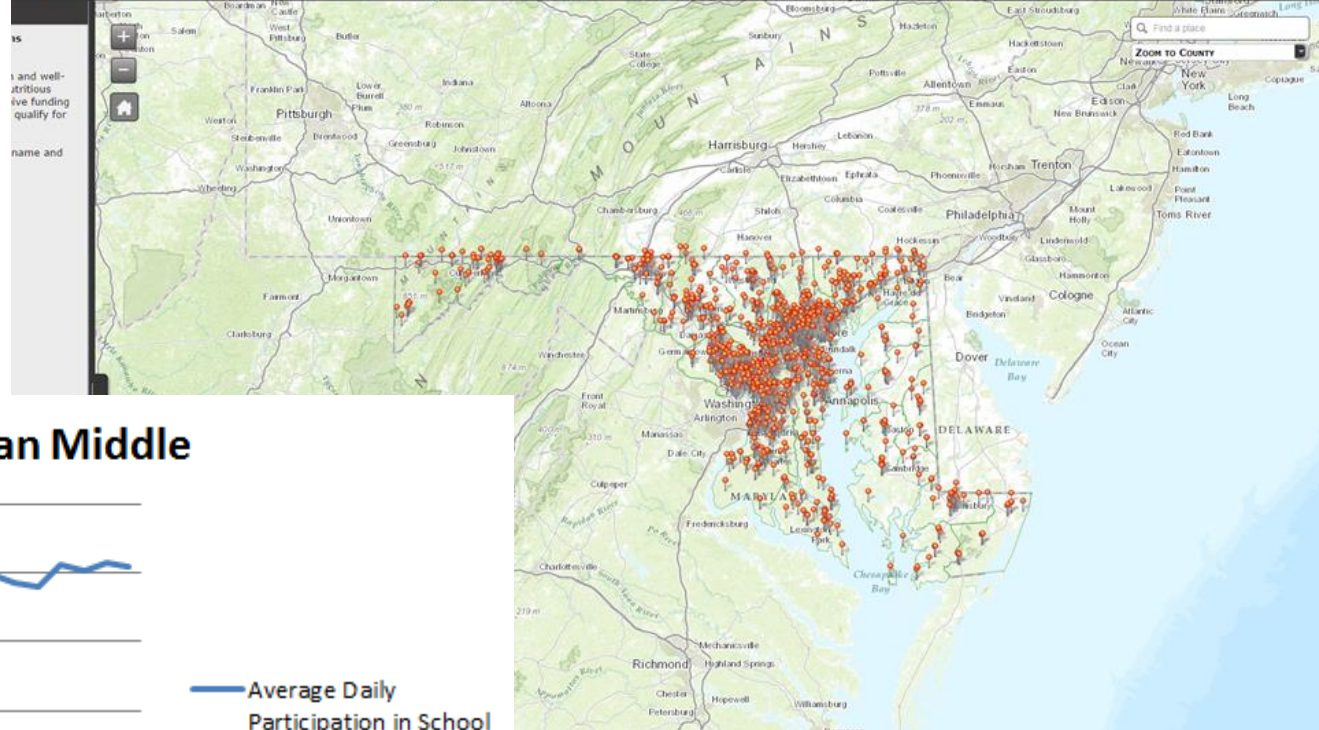

February 2010 and February 2012**

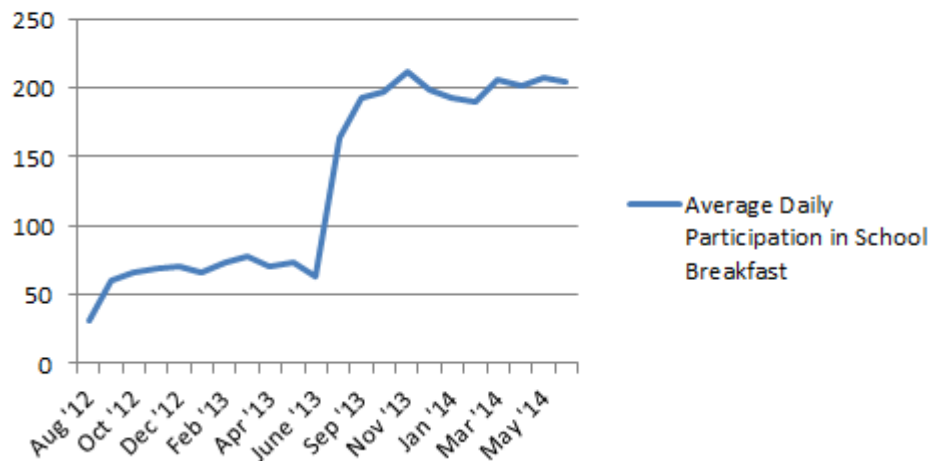

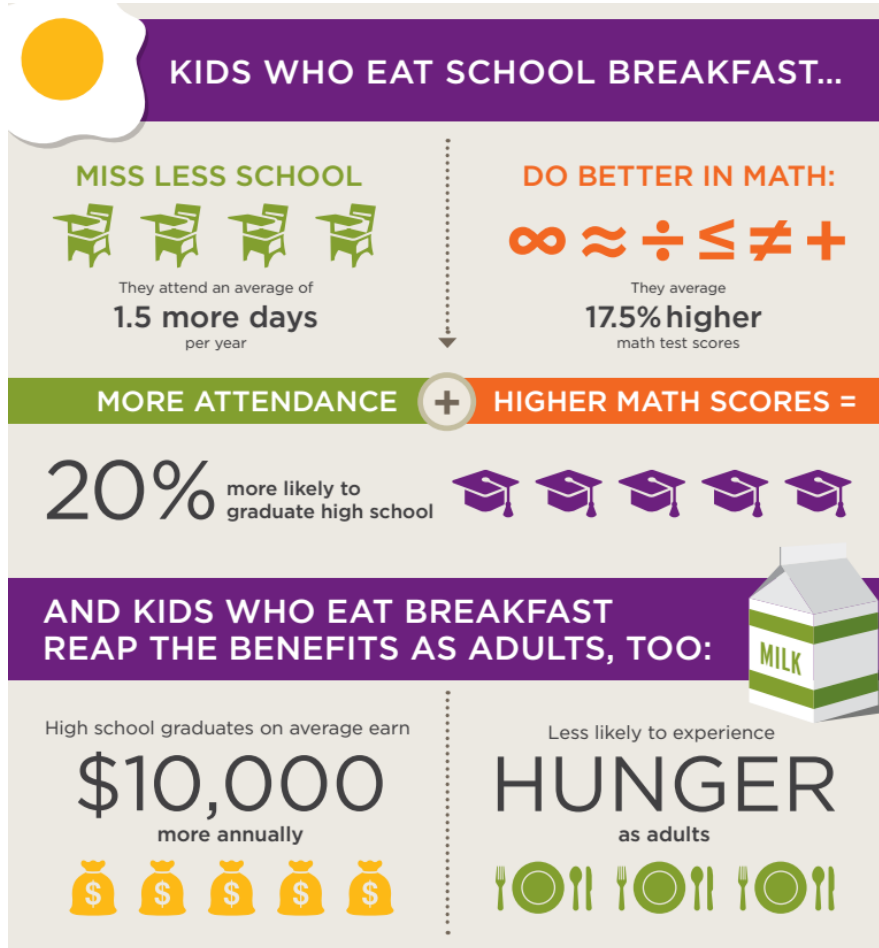

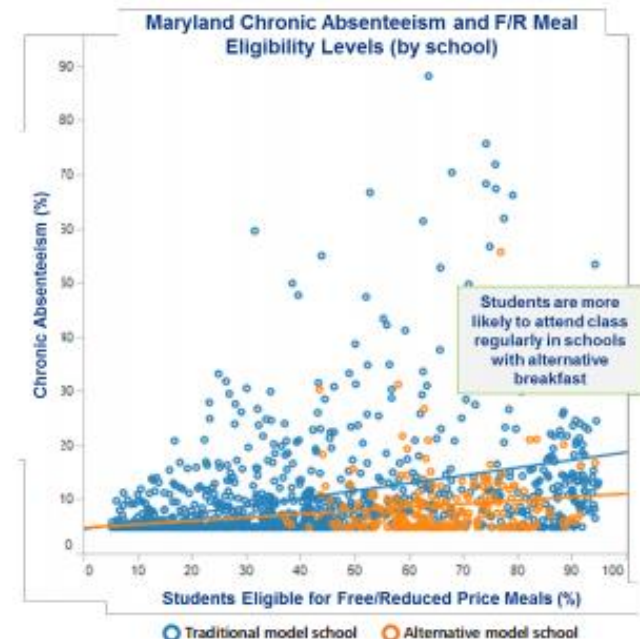
Maryland as a Case Study
