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


Who We Are

- Florida Voices for Health is a 501(c)(3) health care advocacy organization. We promote reforms through story collection, community outreach and education, and through relationships with media and lawmakers.
- We lead some coalition-based campaigns on different healthcare issues.
- Our issues include:
 - Strengthening Florida Medicaid
 - Improving access to Oral Health
 - Increasing access for Floridians with disabilities
 - Protecting Floridian Health Care Consumers
- Our main function is **capturing the health care stories** of Floridians and sharing them with lawmakers, the media, and our communities.

Oral Health in Florida

- Nearly 6 million Floridians living in areas (276) that have limited or no access to care. A designation it would take over 1,300 dental providers to fix completely.
- More than 1.7 million Medicaid enrolled children in Florida did not have a dental visit in 2021.
- Florida remains 2nd from the bottom for percentage of Medicaid enrollees who received any dental visit at all.
- In 2021, total charges for non-traumatic dental conditions treated in Florida's hospitals
 exceeded one-half billion dollars. 116,690 visits to hospital emergency departments (EDs) for preventable dental conditions

(Root) Causes & Solutions


- There's a clear disconnect between those who create these systems and the people who use them.
- Quantitative data without additional context is limited in its ability to move decisionmakers.
- Bridging the gap to achieve systems change requires engaging both patients and decisionmakers

Hidden Voices in A Fragmented Democracy

- Though Medicaid beneficiaries are key stakeholders in the American health care system, many of them hardly make a blip on anyone's political radar. (Pg11)
- Research has shown that the structure and design of government programs can influence civic and political participation by channeling resources, generating interest, and shaping interpretive schemas. (Pg61)
- Compared to non-beneficiaries who are similarly situated in terms of age, sex, receipt of cash assistance, education, race, marital status and income, Medicaid beneficiaries are still significantly less likely to participate (politically). (Pg77)
- We should expect a group of people who are demographically similar to Medicaid beneficiaries but not enrolled in the program to also be less politically active.

Helping people process and make sense of their experiences.


 Connecting people with others and understand that they're not alone in their struggles.
