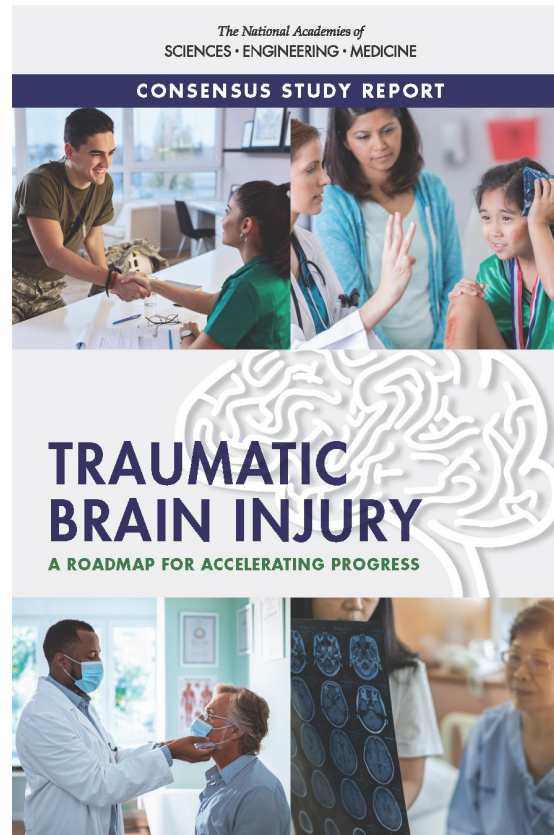
Traumatic Brain Injury Program Reauthorization Act of 2024

The 2024 TBI Act language called the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to:

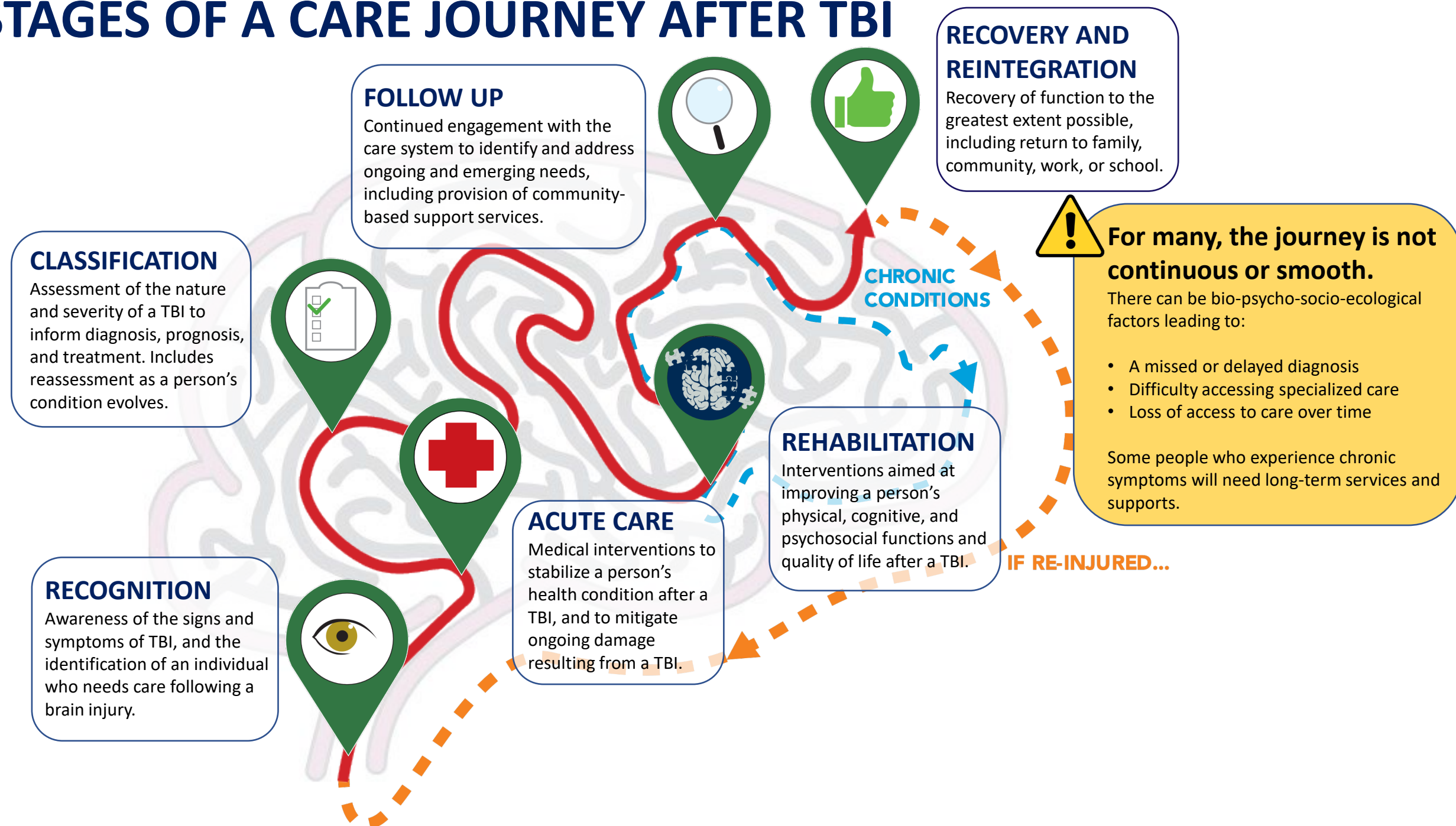
“Examine the evidence base for designating brain injury as a chronic condition that can impact individuals with brain injury across the lifespan.”

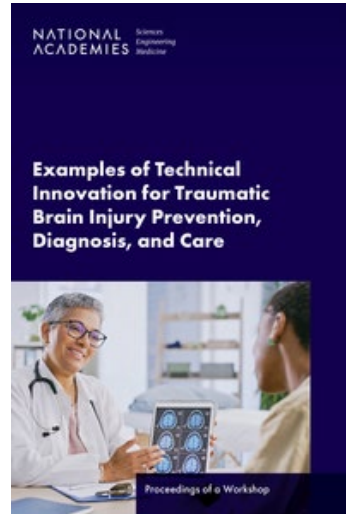

STAGES OF A CARE JOURNEY AFTER TBI



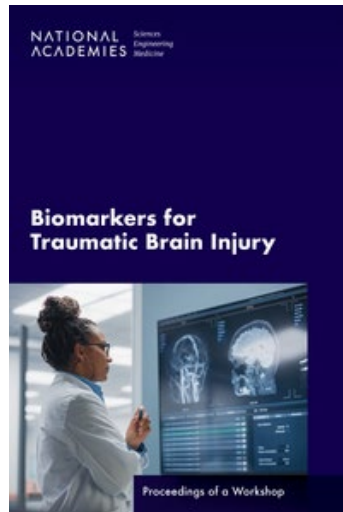

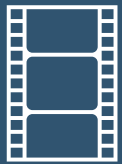
VIDEOS FEATURING LIVED EXPERIENCES
