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
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ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF LAND

I.THE CASE FOR COMMUNITY ENGAGED RESEARCH (CER)

Community Engaged Research (CER):

Involves directly impacted people in the research process

Advances knowledge and is ethically appropriate

Vulnerable groups: significant distrust of researchers

I.THE CASE FOR COMMUNITY ENGAGED RESEARCH (CER)

Community Engaged Research (CER):

Important for addressing rising fatal overdose risk and emerging drug-related harms

Longstanding CER tradition in drug use research

Community-initiated research questions

Capacity development

Full engagement throughout the research process

Transparency

Foregrounds community perspectives

Low-threshold methods

"Methods that promote skill building and are inclusive of people with disabilities, varying substance use, and limited financial and technological resources"

CONNECTION STRATEGIES

Contribution

- Collaborate on projects outside the research focus
- Contribute skills to people's needs outside research focus
- Provide advice and support for other projects

Transparency

- Clear objectives
- Accessible language
- Grant timelines

Positionality

Flexibility in meeting times and structure

Compensation

- All meetings
- In money or in trade
- Avoid gift cards (Festinger et al. 2005, Ritter et al. 2003)



IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGIES

Community centered research questions

- Work from people's needs and concerns
- Develop questions collaboratively
- Develop questions from collaborators' current advocacy projects

Promote full transparency

- Share documents whenever possible
- Share information on funding, timeline
- Explain terminology

Collaborations with organizations

- Built on collaborator's existing practices
- Focus on group work
- Skill sharing



IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGIES

Low threshold inclusive methods

- Employ co-working practices
- Read data and drafts out loud
- Inclusion in:
 - Survey and interview guide design
 - Pilot interviews and surveys (ask for criticism!)
 - Data analysis
 - Manuscript review, writing, and editing
- Care centered work
 - Allow space for emotional discussions
- Ethics training: CIRTIfication programs (Anderson 2015)



IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGIES

Skill-building

- Training in basic research practices and methods
- Data analysis training and one-on-one support
- Trainings on assessing peer-reviewed publications
- Synchronous co-writing as teaching opportunity
- Help write and rehearse talks
- Emphasize transferrable skills





Dissemination

- Prioritize rapid open access dissemination
- Accessible language and in community's familiar venues
- Dissemination in multiple mediums:
 - White papers, webinars, press, plain language summaries, story sharing, and documentary shorts
- Support project ties to advocacy work



CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- Can be time intensive for academic researchers and community researchers
- Involves skill building, low threshold work, and collaborations on outside projects
- Facilitates flow of information from subject to researcher and researcher to directly impacted community members
- Funding for exploratory projects, deeper engagement, collaborator training, community organization infrastructure



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
